REVOLT AT FRISCO
Chinamen Up in Arms Against Increased Rates for Head Shaves.
San Francisco, Aug. 2.—Barbers in Chinatown have raised the price for shaving heads from 25 to 35 cents, and the Chinese head shavers have increased their fees from 25 to 50 cents. The result is almost a revolution in the Celestial quarter, as a Chinese cannot shave his own head, and every Chinaman regards her shaving at regular intervals as a guard against sickness. Several scores of barber shops are scattered through Chinatown, and all do a flourishing business, as the Celestial head must be shaved every day to keep up proper appearances.

The barbers also clean the ears and trim the eyebrows. The barbers declare that the high prices of food and the excessive rents compel them to make an advance in the time-honored price of a "razor-blow." The herb doctors claim that they have been underpaid for years and they cite the fees of the white doctors as proof that at 50 cents their prescriptions are very cheap.

The dead walls of Chinatown are flaming with red posters today attacking the barbers and doctors for advancing their prices, but these lampoons have had no effect.

Guard "Came Back."
It was coming back from exercise. The custom of the institution provides one guard for each gang. Their evening morning it so happened that a full group of guards passed close by that in which the champion marched. This annoyed "the boy" (a blacksmith).
