LORD ROTHSCHILD HAS
TAKEN UP FLYING GAME

Latham Will Try to Sail Over
the Pyramids at the Egyptian Meeting.

Paris, Jan. 24.—Baron Henri de Rothschild is one of the latest converts to aviation. He has not yet attempted any flights, but has had built a monoplane of special design with two propellers, one at the front, and one at the rear of the biplane.

Prince Henry of Prussia is also showing keen interest in aeroplanes. He recently spent a long time on the new flying ground near Darmstadt.

A well-known aeronaut declares he knows of many well-known society people in all the European capitals who only lack the encouragement of finding a safe machine before becoming devotees of what promises to be the sport of the future. This is especially the case among men who, like Prince Henry of Prussia, are enthusiastic motorists.

The select coteries which have been largely instrumental in making ballooning so popular in society, is also taking a keen interest in the development of the aeroplane.

In this world of aviation interest is centering at the moment on the desert meeting, which is to add to the gaiety of life at Cairo early next month. It is to be held at Helopolis, which may be described as a desert suburb of Cairo, and a town which has its site on an oasis. The meeting promises to be one of exceptional interest, for a number of well-known aviators will be competing, and the conditions, both as regards climate and location, should be nearly ideal. OTTAWA TEAM TAKES
LEAD IN NATIONAL

By Defeating Les Canadiens, of Montreal, Saturday—Neither Team Showed Class.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—By defeating the Les Canadiens of Montreal, the Ottawa team took the lead in the race for the championship of the National Hockey Association. About 3,000 people witnessed the match which was slow on account of the heavy ice. It was exciting at times, however, for the Ottawa team made the score 3 to 4 in the second half, Ottawa being the tenth goal about five minutes before the end of the game, and thus clinching it. WILL OPEN TONIGHT

Automobile Dealers' Association
Makes Its Annual Bow at
Wayne Gardens.

GREAT RANGE IN PRICE

Cars From \$500 to \$7,500 Will Be
Shown—Londoners Go To-
morrow.

Detroit, Jan. 24.—At the Wayne Gardens this evening the Detroit Automobile Dealers' Association will make its annual bow with the most pretentious and elaborate exhibition that has ever been shown in connection with the industry. Nothing has been left undone in the way of preparations, and the thousands who will visit the show during the week will be amply rewarded not only as a matter of pleasure but also of instruction.

Every Car Serviceable.

Giant strides have been made towards the goal of perfection in automobile construction, and this year's show will demonstrate the adaptability of the industry to meet the varying demands that have been made upon it. The fundamental principle of every car is that it must be serviceable, and this has been worked out in a multiplicity of ways. In fact, the many different designs of cars which will be seen typify the cosmopolitan character of the American people.

Great Range in Price.

First of all, this will be illustrated in the great range of prices. The utility of the automobile has made it imperative that cars be built to meet the requirements of the average man and the average purse. Necessarily there is a wide latitude which begins with the runabout, costing less than \$500, and gradually ascends the scale until the big motor, costing \$7,500, are reached. There will be many intermediate types to attract attention, all worthy of attention. In addition, the show this year will further demonstrate the adaptability of the automobile. One has only to look at the array of delivery wagons, ambulances, and, in fact, every sort of conveyance that the horseless age is not far distant.

The "Million Dollar" Show.

CHICAGO SOX WILL
TRAIN IN CALIFORNIA

But for the Last Time, Says Comiskey
—Ball Fans Petition for the Re-
instatement of Kling.

New York, Jan. 23.—The Chicago White Sox, under the leadership of their new manager, Hugh Duffy, will go to California to train again this year, but it will be for the last time, according to President Comiskey. The players, more than 25 in number, will report to Chicago about Washington's birthday, and on Feb. 25 they will leave for San Francisco.

Duffy takes a crack shortstop in Blackburn, from Providence to the Sox, which means that Fred Parent may play second base permanently, and George Davis may be a fixture at first base.

Chicago fans, by the way, want Murphy and Chance to take back Catcher Johnny Kling. They are putting their names to a petition which will be sent to the management asking for Kling's reinstatement. The fans, however, have arrived at the conclusion that the absence of Kling last year was the cause of the Sox' failure to win the championship, and for that reason they are going to force Murphy, they say, to pay Kling what he asks.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Jan. 23.—Once again Hugh McIntosh, the noted Australian promoter, has been turned down by Stanley Ketchel, McIntosh's best in the fighting, cabled Ketchel offering him three bouts that would net him close to \$40,000. One of these bouts would be with Burns, another with Bill Lang and the third with an unknown opponent.

McIntosh would have any trouble finding the Michigan boy's answer for Stanley cabled back just the word "No."

Wants to Meet Thomas.

The truth of the matter is that Ketchel wants to go to Australia to meet Burns and others who are picked out for him, but he wants to take on a few others first to lead up to this bout. At present he wants badly to meet Thomas, the undisputed middleweight champion of Great Britain.

Ketchel realizes that without defeating Thomas he cannot rightfully claim the world's championship middleweight title, but must be satisfied with his present title of middleweight champion of America.

At present a prominent New York man is negotiating with Thomas to land the bout for Ketchel in London early in June.
