OXFORD MEDICAL ASSN.

Several Important Papers Read at the Lakeside Meeting.

A meeting of the Oxford Medical Association was held at Lakeside yester-day afternoon and was largely at-tended. Dr. Odium, of Woodstock, presided, and during the afternoon pa-pers were read by Dr. Smith, of St. Marys, on "Specialists and Their Rela-tion to the Profession," and by Dr. Murray, on "Cases in General Prac-tice." In the course of the latter pa-per the doctor made a strong plea for the general practitioner to get a larger fee than he does at the present time. Among the London physicians who attended the meeting were Drs. W. J. and H. A. Stevenson and Dr. Mc-Williams.

DUGAN RECOVERING

But He May Not Be Able to Ride Again This Year.

New York, July 22.—Jockey Eddie Duggan is slowly recovering from an attack of pneumonia, and will not be able to ride for some time. The Jockey Club meanwhile has taken no action on the boy's suspension for rough riding imposed by the stewards at Sheepshead Bay. This is taken to mean that Duggan may not be allowed to ride again this year.
