EX-ALD. HEAMAN RETURNS FROM WEST

Londoner Tells of His Impressions—Vancouver Will Be Great City.

Mr. Wm. Heaman, with a party of Londoners, has just returned home from a trip to Victoria, having visited many cities en route, Winnipeg being the first stop, which is undoubtedly one of the finest cities of the west. Mr. Heaman told The Advertiser the story of his trip as follows: "As we journeyed across the prairie we found the crops to be very poor, with the exception of the country from Regina to Moosejaw, where the wheat was good, but farther west everything was burnt up, resulting in a partial failure. Our next stop was Medicine Hat, which is a town of about 7,000 population, and is an ideal place, having a great flow of natural gas, together with many other advantages. From this point we took the Crow's Nest Pass, touching Lethbridge and Fernie, where we saw the coal mines and coke ovens.

"The other western cities we visited were Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, Tacoma and Calgary. Vancouver is destined to be the greatest city in the west, but I would not advise anyone to invest in real estate at the present time, everything being very high. Building lots have been sold as far out in the country as ten miles, and at very high prices, but my opinion is that these people will never get their money back, and eventually a slump will come.

"Victoria has a beautiful climate, and is quite a residential city, some very wealthy people residing there. It is a very quiet place, and the citizens are willing that it should be.

"Seattle surpassed all our expectations. The lighting of the streets is one of the things which could not escape anyone's attention, and is something that our city could imitate with good grace.

"Calgary, though affected by the crop failure, is a growing city, and is bound to be the central city of Alberta in the future. One thing I noticed in particular was that everybody boasted his own city or town, making no complaints whatever, which example we in our beautiful Victoria could also imitate in the east, might follow to our advantage.

"While the west may have many opportunities, still I did not see any place as good as our own city. I am more contented to stay in London than ever before, and I do not hesitate in saying that there are just as many of the golden opportunities here as in the west."

WESTERN FAIR PUTS CITY BUSINESS IN REAR

Civil Bodies Will Not Bother Themselves Much This Week.

The present week will be rather quiet in civic matters. Tomorrow is the regular time for the board of health to meet, but the session will not be held until Tuesday, Sept. 20, owing to the Western Fair.

The committees will hold their regular meetings this week, but there is nothing much to be settled.

The matter of the purchase of a new fire engine will not be dealt with, as tenders have just been called, and it will take some time to receive prices from big dealers in these machines.

The board of works has a head engineer settled so far as they are concerned, and there is nothing else of a startling nature to be discussed.

The Assessment Rolls.
The finance committee have rounded out their work for some time. The question of the publication of the assessment rolls will be dealt with on Monday evening next at the council meeting. The lateness of the season may have something to do with the desire of some to publish the rolls, but it is possible that the council will order the publication.

So far no great opposition has developed against the appointment of Mr. A. H. Van Cleave, of Niagara Falls, as head engineer. From what can be learned he will undoubtedly be named.

The session next week will be an interesting one, but the council will enjoy an easy time this week.

YOUNG MEN'S SLATE FOR CITY COUNCIL

A Move On Foot to Put Young Blood Up For the Next Election.

There is some talk of a young man's slate for the city council next year. At the present time it is understood that negotiations are under way to induce eight or ten young men, equally divided as to politics, to enter the municipal field.

Some have already consented, and if the matter can be carried through to the successful conclusion it is more than likely that a council composed of young business and professional men, as well as a representative or two of the Trades and Labor Council will enter the lists.

NO SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Appointment of Mr. Van Cleave Will Not Be Rushed.

There will probably be no special meeting of the council to name Mr. A. H. Van Cleave, of Niagara Falls, as head engineer. The appointment will not likely be ratified until Monday night next. Mr. Van Cleave is in the hospital suffering from a slight indisposition that necessitated a minor operation, but he is recovering and will be about shortly. The aldermen are busy with the Fair and will have little or no time for city business.

KICKED BY A COLT

J. W. Nichol, of Westminster, Badly Hurt.

Mr. J. W. Nichol, of Westminster Township, was seriously injured last week by a kick from a colt, and his condition is still considered critical. He was milking the cows, and one of his colts, running loose, was annoying him. He got up to drive it away, when it turned suddenly and kicked him in the left leg of the stomach with both feet. He was found in an unconscious condition, and removed to the house.

Several physicians were summoned, and they considered the case hopeless. However, he rallied on Saturday, and although he is still in a dangerous condition, there are hopes for his recovery.

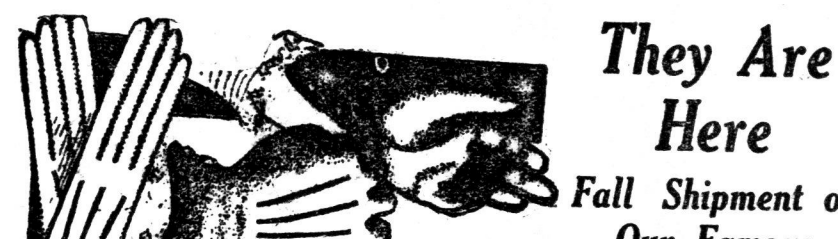

TIPLESS HOTEL SUCCEEDS

Tried in London For a Year and Found to Work Well.

London, Sept. 12.—The experiment of a non-tip hotel in the Strand in London has proved a success. Since the establishment was opened a year ago there has not been a vacant bedroom, a record which could not be equalled by any other London hotel. Every day the management has had to refuse visitors. Altogether nearly a quarter of a million guests have stayed at the hotel in the 344 days it has been open.

The success of the hotel, the directors believe, is mainly due to the non-tip rule. Guests are forbidden to offer any servant of the hotel a gratuity and servants found accepting them are instantly dismissed. People know exactly what it is going to cost them before they set foot in the hotel and when they pay their bill there is no need for them to put their hands into their pockets to tip anybody.

Although the rule against tipping is rigidly enforced by the management, there have been visitors who have insisted upon offering gratuities. In order to protect the management has had to request these visitors either to abide by the regulations or to seek accommodation elsewhere.

The management has had no difficulty in securing plenty of waiters and chambermaids despite the fact that they receive no tips.

WOULD TAKE AWAY THE NEGRO'S VOTE

Texas Legislature Inaugurates Measure to Disfranchise Colored Race.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 10.—The opening gun in the campaign for the disfranchisement of the negro was fired here yesterday, when the House of Representatives of the Texas Legislature adopted a resolution calling on the Texas delegations in both houses of congress to do all in their power to secure the modification of the fourteenth and the repeal of the fifteenth amendments to the national constitution.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 51 to 34 after a vigorous appeal in its behalf by its author, Dr. C. R. Yantis, of Athens, Texas. The resolution goes to the Senate for action, and there is little doubt that the Upper House will also endorse the movement.

for perpetuating the supremacy of the Caucasian race politically as well as socially and declares strongly in favor of denuding the negro of his election franchise.

In appealing for the adoption of the resolution Representative Yantis said he could remember when he had to walk between rows of bayonets in the hands of kinky-headed negroes to get to the ballot box at a time when Texas was in the grasp of the carpet-bagger.

Deep down in the heart of every negro, he declared, is a hope of social equality either for himself or his posterity, and undercurrents of these sentiments, he asserted, run through the writings of Booker T. Washington and other leading negroes.

He urged prompt action to restrain the negro. It is believed the adoption of the resolution will cause a serious agitation of the question not only in the House but throughout the north.

Paris, Sept. 11.—The Pope has telegraphed his best wishes and the apostle him nearly all night to save his life.

BOY BADLY STUNG BY BEES.
Eaton Rapids, Mich., Sept. 10.—Floyd Rinke, two years old, George Rinke, of Dimondale, son of a neighbor. The child was stung more than 100 times before he could be rescued, and a physician worked over him nearly all night to save his life.

A TORONTO SUICIDE.
Toronto, Sept. 11.—The body of Mrs. Cole, about 45 years old, wife of William S. Cole, 108 Denison avenue, was recovered from the bay at the foot of Spadina avenue shortly after 1 o'clock this morning. The woman either jumped or fell into the water about 12:30 a.m. A G. T. R. watchman saw her go down to the wharf, and later heard a splash. He summoned assistance, but the woman was dead when her body was found. Mrs. Cole is said to have been worrying about the recent death of her mother, and the ill health of her father.
