HOT EXCHANGES IN THE COMMONS

WANTED-THE LOAN OF \$1,200 ON Telling Thrusts On Trusts By Guthrie Stirs Up Mr. Ames.

BAD DAY FOR THE GOVT.

The Opposition Proposals to Improve Tariff Commission Bill Rejected on Party Vote. Ottawa, Feb. 13. — On a straight

party vote of seventy-six to forty-two, Government majority of thirty-four. Mr Parliament tonight rejected Guthrie's committee amendments to the tariff commission bill. amendments called for the striking out of the clause placing the control of the commission under the Minister of Finance, and the substitution of a clause providing that it should be responsible and report to Parliament. A third amendment called for the striking ut of the clause referring to the proposed commission, the 'n'es tigation of the combines and mergers, as such inv stigation could better and more disinterestedly be performed by the courts and the machinery provided by the existing anti-combines act. Some stormy zenes characterized the close of the long debate. Mr. Guthrie described Mr. Foster's confession that the Conservative Governent of the past had fashioned its tariff on the rule-of-thumb system 'It was a humiliating confession, and venture to say accounts for the fact that times under such a regime were hard and the count J at a standstill. minister, however, presumes when he ventures to say Mr. Fielding followed similar system. No man is more strongly opposed to the present proposal than would be Mr. Fielding, were he here. The Fielding tariff was not made after the rule-ofhumb. It was formulated only after careful and critical investigation. And times were good, the country prospered, and Canada developed." (Liberal cheers.) Guthrie and Ames.

Mr. Guthrie called upon the Government to let the bill stand over for two or three weeks till the country had an opportunity to study it. He knew very little about trusts.

Mr. Ames, interrupting, "Nothing "I quite ppreciate that the hon. gentleman who has just interrupted knows more than I, and probably the Minister of Finance knows more than either of us," retorted Mr. Guthrie. "That is the trouble," shouted Mr. Ames. "Hon. gentlemen opposite talk about something they do not understand." (Conservative cheers.)

"We are seeking to state plain, olunt facts as they appeal to the ordinary man, the ordinary citizen of responded Mr. Guthrie, "Why should the Ames-Canada," warmly. Holden Company, with a limited canital, be capitalized for two or three imes that amount? It is a fraud on the face of it, I say, of such transactions, and I am not surprised that the Ames-Holden merger would prefer to be investigated by such a tariff commission, and would be reluctant to go before the judges of the high court." Mr. Ames rose in heat. "The hon. member has alluded to the company with which I am connected. I want to tell him that every dollar of bonds is represented in actual money, and not a dollar of dividend will be paid on the common stock until that also represents actual assets." (Renewed

Conservative cheering.) Cheers for Trusts.
