JACK JOHNSON MUST GIVE HIMSELF UP IF HE WOULD RETURN

"Unconditional Surrender."

CHICAGO. Jan. 29.—"Unconditional surrender is the only basis on which local federal officials will treat with Jack Johnson, negro puglist. This ammouncement was made today by District Attorney Charles F. Clyne, after treating The Associated Press dispatch from Mexico City to the effect that Johnson planned to return to the United States, and face his penitentiary sentence for violation of the Mann act. Johnson's indictment was the result of charges that he paid the railroad fars of a woman from Pittsburg to Chargo, and he was sentenced to one states in the penitentiary and fined \$1.000.


