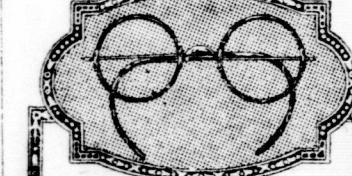

"THE KID" PLEASES CROWDS AT GRAND

Charlie Chaplin Comes Back in Best of Screen Productions Yet.

A picture that makes you laugh and cry almost at the same moment because the pathos and comedy are so skillfully blended, is the verdict of everyone who saw "The Kid," played at the Grand Theatre on Monday afternoon and evening, and which is showing the entire week. Charlie Chaplin has to share his honors with "the kid," played by little Jack Coogan, who has become famous as the child actor of the screen world. Charlie is just making you roar with laughter when "the kid" comes along with the real emotional acting of an adult person in the midst of woes, and you hardly know whether to laugh or cry.

"The Kid" is introduced to London audiences in the role of a forsaken child; an appealing, wistful-eyed little wail. In the emotional scenes which "the kid" is called upon to portray, he is very clever, and his serious unconsciousness in other scenes is just as remarkable. Charlie Chaplin plays not only comedy parts in this picture, but stars himself as an emotional actor as well. As the tramp he is irresistibly funny, and his role as father partner to "the kid" is pathetic. The story is a very real one of a young girl, whose only sin is motherhood. She leaves her infant in a limousine which is stolen by thieves, who, finding the child cast it beside an ash heap and garbage can. Charlie, as tramp, comes along and finds it, and though dropping it into the different baby carriages and other garbage heaps, finds it brought back to him every time.

His idea of bringing the child up is a story in itself, and his way of fighting the little child's battles dampens many an eye. His mother, who, in the meantime has become an actress of fame, appears on the scene, and shortly after Charlie has to climb roof tops and chimneys to claim his kid, and in the end claims the mother and kid, too.

ASHPLANT CHARGES BEFORE PRIVILEGES COMMITTEE TODAY

First Time Committee Has Met For Past Ten Years.

SEVERAL OTHER CASES

Most of Charges Insinuate Liability of Legislators To Accept Bribes.

TORONTO, April 18.—The privileges and elections committee of the Ontario Legislature has been called for tomorrow morning. This will be the first meeting of the committee since William Proudfoot, then Liberal member for South Huron, made charges on the floor of the House against the late Hon. W. J. Hanna, former provincial secretary, who was referred to the committee. That was about ten years ago.

The matter to be referred to the committee, beginning tomorrow, are as follows:

Alleged statement by ex-Ald. Ashplant of London, Ontario, that members of the Legislature could be bribed to put through the City Gas Company bill.

Alleged statement by Andrew Hicks, E. F. O. whip, that vast sums of money were floating around.

Alleged statement by D. J. Taylor of Simcoe that he had been offered \$1,000 for "influence."

Statement attributed to R. W. E. Burnaby, president of the United Farmers of Ontario, that he had been approached by men willing to pay good money for his influence with the Government in securing positions.

Reflections which R. R. Hall, M.L.A., Parry Sound, were cast upon him by the Evening Telegram of Toronto in connection with the wrecking of the Parry Sound power plant in a recent flood.

Statement said to have been made by C. P. Swazey, M.L.A., Niagara Falls, Labor whip, that M. M. MacBride, Labor M. L. A. for South Brant, was "insincere" in his course as a member of the special committee of the Legislature that was sent to Niagara last fall to try to settle the strike at the Chippewa Canal development.
