

WANTS CLOUD OF SUSPICION CLEARED AWAY

Board of Education Unable To Grant Trustee Eggett's Request.

SUPERVISING PRINCIPAL

At the regular meeting of the board of education Tuesday afternoon, after the correspondence had been dealt with, Dr. E. W. Fuller, school dentist, asked the board to appoint another dentist to help him with his work among the school children of the city. He outlined the work that the dentists were doing, and urged the appointment because he said that they were now working up to the limit, and there was still a lot of children not getting the dental service necessary. He thought another dentist would overcome this situation.

Senior Public School Inspector Green's report recommended the appointment of G. A. Wheable, principal of Empress Avenue School, to be assistant supervising principal until such a time as a suitable assistant inspector can be appointed. The recommendation was acted on by the board, and Mr. Wheable was appointed.

At this point the tender for electric fixtures for the new collegiate institute was brought up and discussed freely. The chairman of the committee said that they had given the contract to the Galt firm because they thought that they were getting the best deal, not only in price, but in other ways. This led the way for discussion as to why a London firm had not been given the contract, and the answer was that all the tenders were figured out on the basis of supplying the same fixture, and that the tender had been let to the lowest bidder. The tenders were brought out and this was found to be correct.

Trustee Rowe discussed the question and expressed himself as favorable to patronizing a London concern other things being equal.

Furnishing Contracts. When the report of the contracts concerning the furnishing of the institute was submitted, Trustee Rowe asked why it was that more time was not given in which to receive tenders. Local firms had not been given a chance to get their estimates together and present them in time. Trustee Langford replied that they had not had a list of requirements until shortly before the meeting was called, but when they had the list they had advertised right away, and owing to the fact that the school was to be opened so soon they had limited the time for the contracts to be received.

It was at this point that Trustee Eggett said that a cloud of suspicion was hanging over the board in the eyes of the public, and he wished, since he was not to be on the board next year, that anything that could be cleared up in regard to this would be done before he left the board. He asked that a committee be appointed to investigate the actions of all standing and special committees with this end in view, but this was ruled out of order.

Wortley Road Lights. 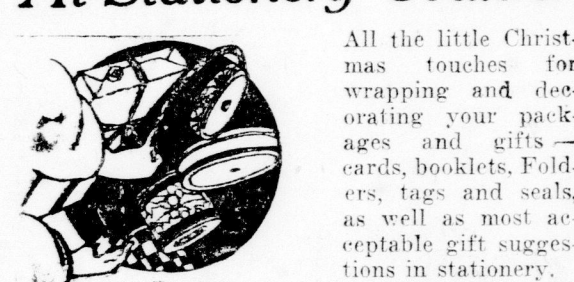

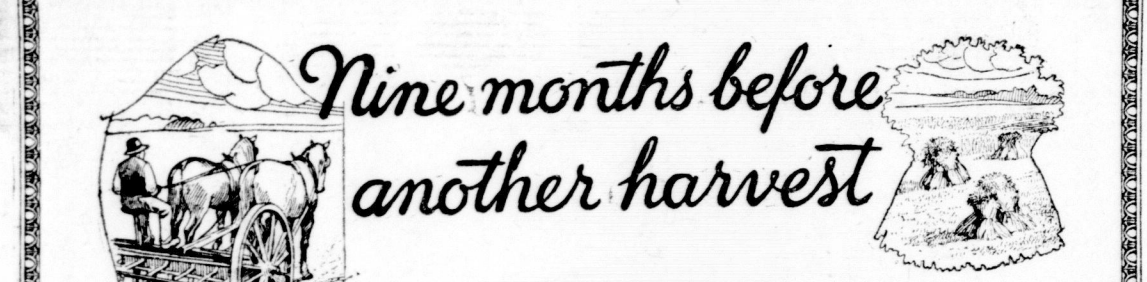

ASK PAYMENT FOR CARE OF CIVIC BEARS

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 5.—No. 1 committee of the city council, in charge of the finances of the city, were treated to a warm session at their regular meeting Monday night, when a deputation from the St. Thomas Humane Society waited upon them to urge payment of an account

of \$285, which the society claims is due them for the care of bears which suffered from tallow last summer in the city zoo.
Mrs. Dr. Alice Gray, secretary, and J. E. Mattie, provincial and city inspector of the Humane Society, presented the case of the society. A compromise was reached when a committee composed of Aldermen McIntyre, Butler, Raven and D. A. Cavanagh, and Mrs. Dr. A. Gray and Dr. Ball of the

Humane Society were appointed to go into the matter with power to reach a settlement.
The committee voted a grant of \$250 to the St. Thomas Poultry Association towards the cost of a poultry show to be held during the last week of December. The sum was an increase of \$50 over the usual annual grant.
