A merchant named Elliott, at Enniskillen, fired on the raiders when his house was attacked, and it is be-lieved he wounded one of them. The merchant himself was not wounded Attacks were also made on the

Specials" was ambushed near Newtown Butler last evening by a large party of armed men. An engagement resulted in which casualties were sustained on both sides. While this fight was occurring the residences of other constables of the same or-ganization were visited, and a number of the constables were kidnapp and carried over the border.

At noon today Registration Inspec Doonan, a prominent Unionist of Newtown Butler, was taken to the Lospital at Enniskillen suffering from gunshot wounds.


FIREMEN PLEAD GUILTY TO CHARGE OF MUTINY
