The pamphlet says: "It is no longer the one wife and her children who have legal claims on the husband and father, but other women and their children have first claims backed and supported by all the machin-ery of the law. If at the man's death his widow refuses to pay either a lump sum, or a sum of money weekly, to support the other woman's child she may be sent to the common jail for six months. Already a man has received such a sentence in default of payment.

"All proceedings under this act are to be held by the judge in his chambers and not in open court-here the widow and her children will be forced to appear alone and unprotected in their hour of need, while the woman who has broken the moral law has a government official to act for her, and the law forces the widow to pay. It is left to the discretion of the judge to allow the legal widow and her children 'Necessary maintenance.' The act however, as before stated, requires a 'reasonable standard of life for the child of the unmar-

ried woman.'

The manner and terms of the Brantford statement show that those responsible for its issuance are not familiar with the problem in all its bearings as were those responsible for the pressure which resulted in the passage of this law.

Among the latter bodies the provincial committee of the National Council of Women was active. More than 20 years ago the Council of Women asked for incorporation into law of the underlying principles of this bill though they, no less than we, are responsible for certain clauses of the bill which were necessarily introduced in a legal enactment.
