"U" WOMEN'S CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

Executive Council Meets For First Time at Home of New President.

The University Women's club is planning an interesting program for the coming year, tentative arrangements being made at a meeting of the executive held last night at the home of the new president, Mrs. Richard Crouch.

The opening meeting, probably on the second Tuesday of October, will take the form of a high tea for which arrangements are being made by Mrs. Crouch and Mrs. Hungerford. The club is endeavoring to bring to the city someone from Toronto who attended the International University Women's conference in Christiania last summer, and who will speak at an early meeting here.

The suggested program also includes meetings, which will be given over to the study of the League of Nations. It is proposed that another meeting be given over to Georgian poetry, particularly stressing the modern movement of the younger poets in England, as well as contemporary Canadian and American poetry.

The suggestion has also been made that a few minutes be given over at each meeting for the discussion of current events.

The election of officers from the representative council chosen last spring, was a feature of last night's meeting, with the following results: Vice-president, Miss Marion Wright; recording secretary, Miss Evelyn Harrison; corresponding secretary, Miss Mary Granger; treasurer, Miss Kate Macpherson; standing representative to the Canadian Federation of University Women, Miss Mary Granger; representative delegate to the Canadian Federation of University Women meeting in Ottawa on Oct. 10 and 11, Mrs. Ed Grange, formerly of this city.

The Dominion Federation of University Women is seeking to make a survey of the type of work which is being undertaken by university women throughout the country, and with this end in view, the local club has appointed a London representative to the vocational committee of the general federation, to report on the situation in London from time to time.

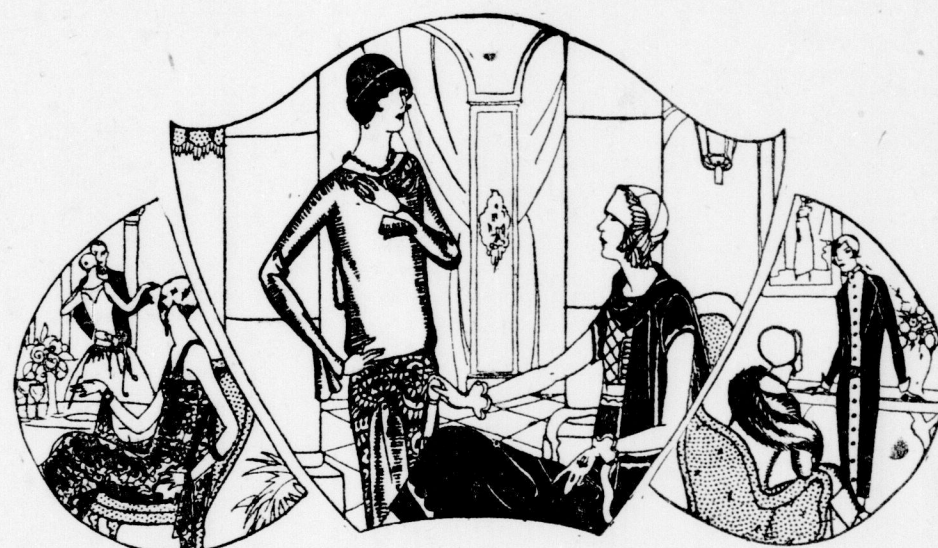
