As runs are what count in base-ball, an analysis of the first eleven games gives some very interesting information. During this period the Tecumsehs had 42 runs scored against them, while they crossed the plate exactly 61 times. In a nutshell this proves that local pitchers have been going nicely, allowing an average of less than four runs per game, and an earned run average of just a little under two, while, on the other hand, the sluggers have been driving in an average of six runs per game.

The manner in which Manager Baker took command of the situation on the third base coaching lines during the last two innings, and especially after two were out in the ninth, instilling confidence in his players came mighty close in itself to tieing the game, and the scrappy fighting exhibition he gave certainly did not pass unnoticed by the fans, but rather convinced them that they are following a real hustling aggregation.

The Tribe is now in the midst of a four-game series at Flint, returning here on Thursday for a three-game series with Les Nunamaker, the former Cleveland catcher, and his Saginaw Aces. Sunday will be an off day for the locals, with Bay City as the attraction for morning and afternoon games on the holiday next Monday.
