

NORTHERN LIFE CO. CONTROL CHANGES HANDS ONCE AGAIN

Majority of Stock Is Purchased From Doherty and Tweed.

BOUGHT BY BROKERS

Canadian Press Despatch.
Toronto, Jan. 30.—The Toronto Star today publishes the following: The control of the stock of the Northern Life Assurance Company—x. Purdom Company at London—has again changed hands, Gairdner Clarke & Co., Toronto brokers, having bought it from Sydney C. Tweed and Hon. Manning Doherty on Monday last.

"The policyholders are not affected by the change. The Dominion Insurance department keeps insurance companies under inspection and supervision, and not one policy of a straight line company in all the history of Canada has failed to be paid on maturity."

"A prolonged struggle went on for control of the Northern Life stock, but finally Tweed and Doherty gathered in more than 5,000 shares, giving them control. The stock had been at a low figure, and offering a fine prospect to investors. The Sun Life offered to take over the business on favorable terms, but the Dominion superintendent of insurance vetoed the plan on the ground that there were few enough companies."

Some weeks ago Tweed and Doherty definitely won the race for control. It is understood that they are at a considerable advance, having like half a million dollars involved.

As to today about the latest of stock control, Gairdner, Co., said they would issue a statement in a week or two."

TAX COLLECTING CHANGES URGED

The Highland and Manor Park Association Holds Enthusiastic Meeting.

At a well attended meeting of the Progressive Ratepayers' Association of Highland and Manor Park, held in the Manor Park schoolhouse last night, much business relative to the interests of the community was transacted.

It was unanimously decided to extend an invitation to members of ratepayers' associations and clubs in the vicinity of London to attend the meetings of the Manor Park association, with the object of exchanging views and ideas, and fostering a fraternal spirit.

Passage of bylaws concerning building restrictions, voting hours, and tax collections, were discussed, and all were agreed that the passage of such bylaws would materially benefit the Manor and Highland district. It was pointed out that the present system of collecting taxes in December of each year imposes a distinct hardship on all residents of the district, and it is hoped the association will be able to have this condition remedied.

The association is in a flourishing condition, and the officers are jubilant over the efforts of the members to successfully support all measures advocated for the benefit of the community.

B. Whitley, president of the association, was in the chair, and carried out his duties in an admirable manner.

STRUCK BY TREE DIES INSTANTLY

George Webber of Ingersoll Killed While Working in Bush.

Ingersoll, Jan. 30.—While working with his brother Joe in the bush on the farm of R. M. Harris, which adjoins the town at the south side, George Webber was instantly killed about 5 o'clock this afternoon.

He was struck a terrific blow on the side of the head by a limb of a falling tree, was forced to the ground on his face and his skull crushed.

Coroner Dr. Williams was summoned and after investigating the fatality deemed an inquest unnecessary.

The victim of the accident was about 73 years of age, and for many years had been engaged in ditching in the neighboring districts with his brother. Prior to his death he had amassed a large fortune. They began cutting wood a few days ago in Harris' bush and they decided to quit work today as soon as they felled one more tree. It was crashing to the ground when George received his death blow.

For a long period the brothers lived in Dereham township, but a short time ago they came to Ingersoll.

CONTRACT AWARDED TO THE HAYDEN PRESS

Council Finds A. A. Langford Not Employing Union Men For Work.

Tenders from the A. A. Langford Company, while the lowest for certain printing, were rejected by members of the finance committee of the city council last night in preference to the tender from the Hayden Press.

The aldermen stressed the fact that they have a resolution on their books, compelling printing done only in union shops. All tenders submitted last night carried the assurance that they paid union wages.

But Ald. Frank McKay protested, stating that there were but three union printing houses in the city, and that Langford's was not one of them.

The committee ruled that their resolution must be adhered to.

DRUNK WARNED TO HOLD SPREES IN ST. THOMAS

Isaac Williams Fined \$10 For Disturbing Mill Street Neighborhood.

Isaac B. Williams, who lives three miles outside St. Thomas, would rather get drunk in London than in the Railroad City, according to police records. He invariably comes here for his sprees, and has appeared in police court several times to answer charges of being intoxicated.

Last night a call was put into the police station from Mill street. The complaint was that Williams had been disturbing the entire neighborhood.

"This man tried to enter any number of houses," Chief Robert Birrell explained.

"If you come here to get drunk again you'll receive a worse penalty than I am going to impose," the magistrate said. "If you want to drink, do your drinking in St. Thomas. Ten dollars and costs."

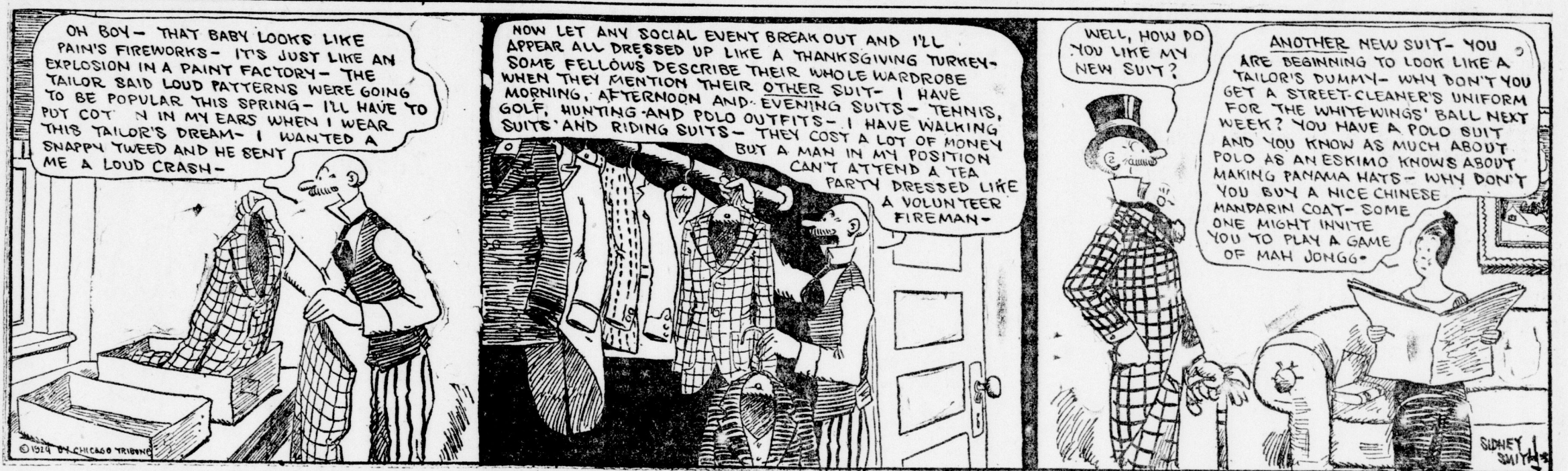
DEAN FOX WILL LECTURE TONIGHT ON CITY OF ROME

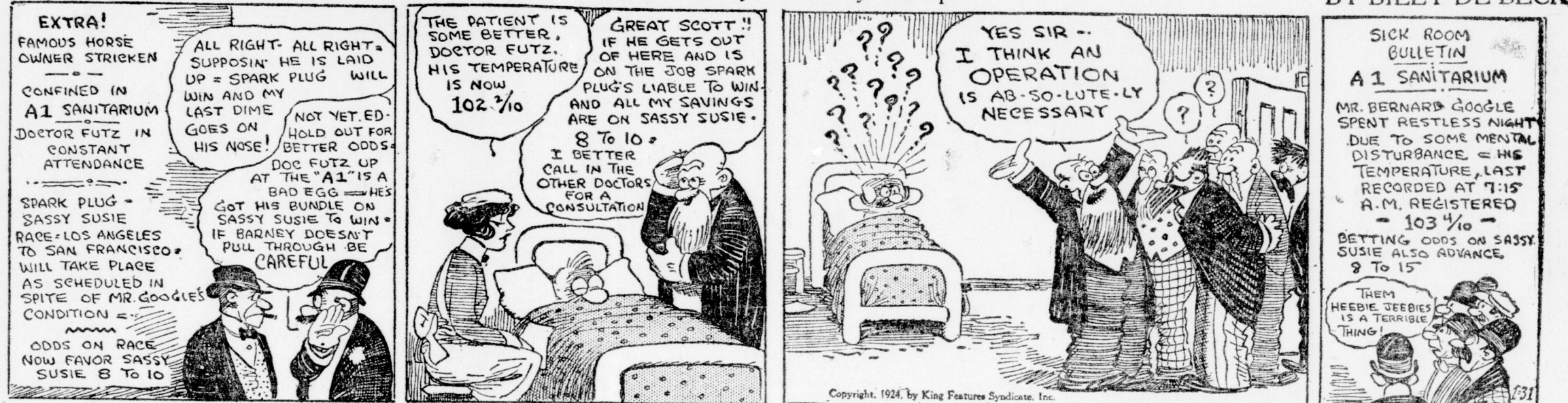

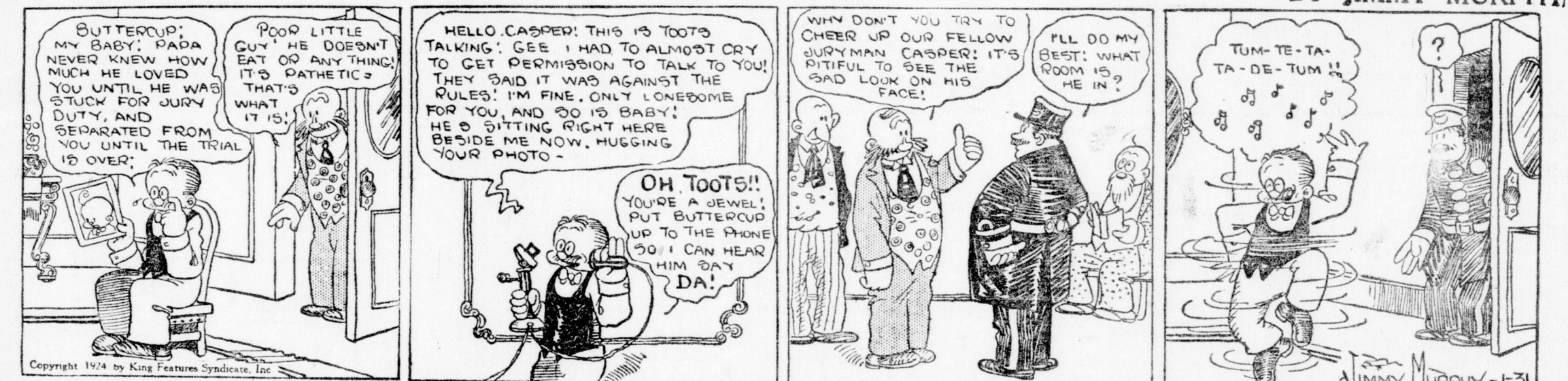

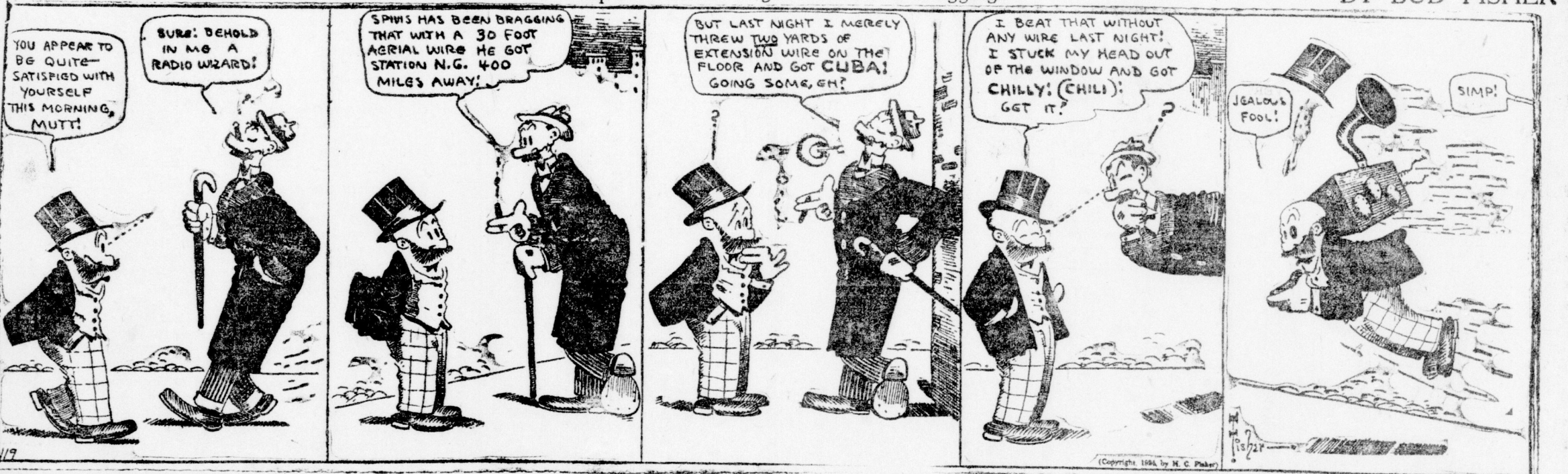
