An Era of Improvement.

What is Being Done to Make Victoria a More Habitable City.

Paving and Sidewalks to Work Great Changes in Business Section.

Victoria is just now the scene of considerable improvement work, and many repairs that have been much-talked-for for some years are being made. Ever since Mr. Topp entered upon his duties as city engineer he has been busy in devising plans for the betterment of the city, with the result that a great deal of good work is now going on.

The principal improvement being made, which will go far toward beautifying that part of town, is the block-paving and sidewalking of Fort street. The work of laying the wooden blocks will begin this week and when completed no doubt the street in a few days will be blasted out of its former appearance. New piles and planks are being added to the Rock Bay bridge, for which an appropriation of \$400 was recently allowed by the council. The work now being well under way. Not far from where the work of repairing the bridge is going on, several cubic yards of rock material are being used in the construction of the electric light plant. This work will also be completed by the end of the week. Sidewalks of the regulation type are being constructed in Victoria West, on Russell, Langford and Catherine streets, and on the north side of Fort street from Vancouver street west, several blocks east.

In his report to the city council to-morrow night, Mr. Topp will recommend the laying of a box drain on Milne street; a sidewalk on Quadra street, between the water works and North Park road; and a wire fence along the reservoir at Beaver lake. A retaining wall on Burnside road and a sidewalk on Belleville street, between Chatham and Yates streets, will also be recommended.

Work is also being removed from the Fort street excavation is being used to fill up holes in various parts of the city, but principally on Belleville street. The outlet of the sewer on Park road; and a wire fence along the reservoir at Beaver lake.
