BRITISH MACHINERY

In the United States it is accepted axiomatic that Great Britain cannot be compared with the United States in the manufacture of machinery. Any proof to the contrary presented is met by conclusions arrived at in the lengthy cor-

conclusions arrived at in the lengthy cor-respondence brought down in the House of Commons are thus summarized by the London Daily News: The subject divides itself into four sections—(1) price, (2) time required for construction, (3) quality, including cost of repairs, etc., (4) the consumption of coal. Under the first of these heads, the coal. Under the first of these heads, the comparison is not seriously against us. Indeed, the English firms were able to tender below the American limit. The latter, however, owing to the advantage of standardization of type in America, quoted 19 per cent. below the British price for engines of a slightly different type from that specified. Broadly speaking, however, it seems that in the matter of cost there is not a great deal matter of cost there is not a great deal to choose between engines of British and American make. It is far otherwise when we come to the question of time. The expedition with which the Ameri-

opean firm was 48 weeks, exactly four opean firm was 48 weeks, exactly four times as long. "It is to the point of expedition that attention should be directed. The notorious superiority of the Americans in this respect, whether due to the methods of the employed or to the different attitude of the employed, is a point which has been constantly brought home to us, but never in a more flagrant way than but never in a more flagrant way than in the present case. In respect of quality, English workmanship easily holds its own, and in one particular we have an advantage which almost balances our loss in the matter of time. The American engines are as coal-consumers are can engines are, as coal-consumers, enormously more costly than the English engines. The contrast in this case is as gines. The contrast in this case is as overwhelmingly in favor of England as the contrast in rapidity of execution is in favor of America. Trials made with both goods and passenger engines show that in the case of the former the American consumed 25.4 per cent. more coal than the British engines, while the latter were drawing 14.2 per cent. more load. In the case of the passenger engines the American consumed 50 per cent. more than the British with the same average load. The latter difference being capitalized adds £400 to the cost of the American engine as against the British.
