A man named Bourque, who claims to belong to Carleton Place and boarded No. 36 express at Bathurst Friday morning with the intention of going to Oldtown, Me., created quite a sensation at the I. C. R. depot at Moncton. The man told the I. C. R. police that he had lost his pocketbook which contained \$75 in cash and his railway ticket from Moncton to Oldtown, Me. Late in the evening a young man appeared at the depot and said that he found the ticket which belonged to the man in the Minto hotel, but how it got there appears to be a mystery. Bourque was under the influence of liquor and whether or not, he was really victimized is doubted. He was placed on board Saturday morning express, and started for his destination. He did not have any money and is just getting over the effects of a drunk.

### TWELVE CARS PILE UP ON SIDE OF TRACK

Bad Spill at Gloucester Junction of Freight Special Early Thursday Morning

As the result, it is believed, of a broken truck, twelve cars of Harvey's freight special, hauled by engine 271, driven by Engineer Thompson of Moncton, left the rails in front of Gloucester Junction station between six and seven o'clock Thursday morning, piling up on both sides of the rails and blocking the main line of the I. C. R. for twelve hours. It was a bad spill and although none of the train hands were injured, all the cars with the exception of one or two which had steel frames, were badly smashed, and the damage to rolling stock will be considerable. The roadbed, too, was also badly torn up, and it required the combined efforts of two auxiliary crews for about eight hours before the line could be cleared sufficiently so that trains could pass. The debris will be cleared away and brought to Moncton.

No. 36 express due to arrive there shortly before two o'clock in the afternoon, was stalled on the wrecked cars, and as the result her passengers and mails were transferred to the passenger cars of No. 39 mixed, which was stalled at this side of the wreck. The train then proceeded to Moncton, arriving there about two hours and a half late. The passengers of No. 39 mixed were transferred to the cars of No. 36 express, and taken to their destination. The Maritime express was not blocked, but had passed Gloucester Junction before the wreck occurred. No. 35 express, which leaves Moncton a few minutes before 11 o'clock in the morning, was also stalled on this side, and her passengers, mail and baggage were transferred to waiting cars on the other side.

No. 199 express, known as the Ocean Limited, was stalled for a short time on this side of the run-off, while No. 200, the eastbound Ocean Limited, was stalled for over five and a half hours and did not arrive until about nine o'clock Thursday evening. Freight trains were also blocked and there were a number cancelled. In all, it was a bad spill.

Gaspeian was able to make Douglstown, as the ice has gone out from the bay almost up to Sandy Beach Point. The steamer arrived in a blinding snow storm, nearly two feet of snow falling. The steamer is unloading her freight at the breakwater, Douglstown.

### SELF EDUCATED DOG PUZZLES SCIENTISTS

Wonderful Animal Talks Quite Intelligently With His Paws

Berlin, April 21.—Rolf, a shaggy Skye terrier, who "talks" by means of a "paw language," is mystifying the scientists of Germany. The little animal reads, counts, adds, subtracts, multiplies, divides, dictates, replies to letters received by him, and even discusses religion. Rolf is owned by Frau Dr. P. Moeckel, the invalid wife of a prominent lawyer, of Mannheim, whose house has become the rendezvous of learned professors, who have submitted Rolf to extraordinary experiments with astounding results. What adds to the peculiarity of Frau Moeckel's dog is that, unlike the famous Elberfeld horses trained by Herr Kral, he is largely self-educated.

Ever since Frau Moeckel purchased him he has been the constant companion of her children. He was allowed to sit by the side of Frau Moeckel's little girl during lessons, and, as it is now recalled, always paid the closest attention. The discovery of Frau Moeckel's dog was made during one of these lessons.

Frau Moeckel states that one day her little girl was unable to answer a simple question in mental arithmetic, when she exclaimed, "How stupid, why even Rolf could answer that. Couldn't you Rolf?" To the amazement of mother and child, Rolf lifted his right paw and beat the exact answer to the problem.

It was naturally thought that the answer was a mere coincidence; but when they gave Rolf another problem, he again returned the correct answer. A third and fourth test followed, until it was evident that the dog knew what he was talking about. Frau Moeckel took him in hand and began to educate him.

An alphabet was fixed up. Frau Moeckel asking, "Rolf, how many paws do you have?" "A," how many for "B," etc. The dog himself designated how many beats of his foot would designate the different letters by which he spells out his thoughts, ideas and answers. Like the Elberfeld horses, Rolf uses something like Colonel Roosevelt's "simplified spelling." He eliminates all useless letters.

### CLAIMS LOTTERIES ARE RUN IN QUEBEC

Hon. Chas. Marcell Brings up The Question in The House of Commons

Ottawa, April 25.—Hon. Charles Marcell in the House yesterday, complained of the character of a company known as the Provident Financial Association, Limited, incorporated in 1905. It was issuing circulars in Quebec, which contained statements that its bonds were recognized by the French Government. Mr. Marcell complained that the company was running a species of lottery. He had already written to the superintendent of insurance, who had informed him that if his suspicions were correct the company could be prosecuted.

He also drew attention to another company called Chesah Gold Mines Promoters, Limited, which had conducted a species of guessing contests, the prize being \$10,000 in gold, and everyone who paid five cents for a guess, receiving one hundred shares of stock. The company was said to be drawing in much money, and Mr. Marcell thought it was all a sham, though done under Dominion Legislation.

Mr. White in reply stated that the Provident Financial Association, Limited, has been given no such powers as it was exercising and the Attorney-General of Quebec should prosecute. He said he would draw the attention of the Secretary of State to the Gold Mining Company.

### HUNTING AND FISHING IN QUEBEC PROVINCE

Department of Colonization. Mines and Fisheries Issues Interesting Booklet

A comprehensive idea of the work done, and privileges enjoyed by the Fish and Game Clubs of the Province, and the various regulations governing the same, are contained in a booklet recently published by the Department of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries, bearing the title "The Fish and Game Clubs of the Province of Quebec. What they mean to the Province, What Privileges they enjoy."

There are at present over two hundred such clubs in the province, and each club contains a list of them all, a description of their territories and privileges, and a table of their membership fees.

The clubs vary in importance, size, and range or territory. The limit for shooting rights granted by the Provincial Government is 200 square miles, but there are many clubs far smaller than this. The fee is a minimum of \$3 per square mile per annum.

Fishing fees depend on the quality and accessibility of the fish. The leases of fish and game rights are not restricted to incorporated fish and game clubs, and the number of leases to individual sportsmen and groups of sportsmen brings the total number of the Province's leases up to about \$500.

The increasing value of fishing rights is pointed out in the following paragraph:—"Less than fifty years ago, a season's fishing in the Province of Quebec was offered for \$100. Today no less a sum than \$12,000 a year is paid for the angling rights of a portion of the river."

The system of Fish and Game clubs, besides providing accommodation for the clubs themselves in an excellent protective measure for the fish and game of the Province. The work done by the clubs could not be accomplished directly by the Government unless through the medium of an army of game wardens, which would in itself be a large expense.

The Fish and Game Clubs are, on the contrary, a source of revenue to the province. Apart from the actual license fees the money spent by the hunters on equipment, etc., is of much benefit to the province, while the money left behind by strangers is a clear net gain to Quebec.

A welcome announcement is made towards the close of the preface, and that is that it is planned by the Government to reserve large tracts of fishing and hunting territory, especially in the newer parts of the Province, which will be open to all anglers and hunters in open season, without fees of any kind to residents of the Province, except for tags for the shipment of game; while the same amount of license fee will be the only charge upon non-resident sportsmen.
