OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The House today passed a quorum on the Orange question by putting a second reading on the bill to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of British America. This was done by a vote of 85 to 69 and after but one speech had been made.

Externally it was one of the quietest debates and divisions ever witnessed in the House considering the intense feeling that has been exhibited over the measure when brought before Parliament on previous occasions.

The management and introduction of the bill was relegated to Charles W. Wallace, Grand Master of British America, and the gentleman from West York handled it with the utmost care and tact. He felt so elated over the matter that after the vote was taken he invited all hands down to the suburban cafe to have a little Orange bitters with him.
