NINE OF THE CREW OF THE ANNIH

YOUNG DROWNED.

The Vessel Burned to the Water's Edge-Part of Those on Board Embark is the Yawl, Which is Swamped, and All Meet with Watery Graves-Galland

Rescue of the Remainder.

Sarnia, Oct. 20.—The propeller Annie Young of the Lake Superior Transit Company, from Buffalo for Duluth, left here this morning at 9 o'clock. About 1½ hours later off Lexington she was discovered to be on fire att. The flames spread rapidly and 10 of the crew including the mate took to one of the small boats, which they launched, but did not clear off the ropes after lowering. The mate climbed up to adjust the ropes and clear the small boat, and on looking down at the boat found she had swamped. The 9 men were drowned. The remainder of the crew, 17 in number, were rescued, being taken off the burning steamer by the barge Edward. They were landed at Port Huron to-day about noon. The boat burned to the water's edge and is now tumbling about of Lake Huron 15 miles from Huron. water's edge and is now tumbing about the Lake Huron 15 miles from Huron.

The drowned are McManard of Por. Huron, J. Donnelly, J. Crosby, J. Gallagher, J. Connelly and three deck hands, names and residences unknown. The Young was of 693 tons burden and valued at \$30,000. The mate was very badly burned about the fact and hands. The Young was bound up with a cargo of coal and general merchandise for Escanaba and Gladstone.

SIR RICHARD AT RENFREW.

He Comes Out Flatfooted for Comme Reciprocity with Uncle Sam.
RENFREW, Oct. 20.—Sir Richard Cart wright addressed a large gathering in Gravell's hall to-night on the trade relations between Canada and the United States. He claimed that the United States was the natural market for most of the products of natural market for most of the products of Canada, and censured the Government for what he characterized as a dereliction of duty in not making closer trade relations with a view to showing the United States as customers for fully one-half of Canada's exports. He claimed that the tendency of a protective tariff was to the formation of rings and trusts for the purpose of increasing the price of goods to be consumed and pronounced himself in favor of unrestricted reciprocity with the United States.
