Who Has the Money?

Times have been good the past year, farmers have got good prices for their products, and wages have been good. Nevertheless seldom has money been scarcer in business circles or accounts slower in being settled. What is the reason and who is to blame? Deposits in the banks have increased, so it can hardly be that the country is poorer. The same reason will not apply in every case but from personal experience and the experience of a number of business men we find that it is the man who has money in the bank drawing interest, who is the slowest pay. The business man extends a line of credit to his customers and at the same time pays seven or eight per cent. interest on his overdraft at the bank. The customer is drawing three per cent. on his money in the bank at the same time and the longer he can stave off payment of his account the more interest he receives.

But is that a square deal? To get down to rock bottom, is it honest? He is actually robbing Mr. Business Man of the interest Mr. Business Man pays out on overdrafts which his credit accounts would pay off, he getting three cents out of seven or eight and the bank the balance. In these days of keen competition when profits are figured down to the narrowest possible margin it makes a serious hole in the year's earnings to have to pay a large sum of money out in interest for your own money that is in other folk's hands.

Perhaps this aspect of the case has never appealed to you, Mr. Man-with-money-in-the-bank. If not and you owe any poor beggar an account go and pay him at once, and keep your accounts paid up so that your reward in the world to come may be accordingly.
