The weather has been very wet, it rains nearly every day. This is a large camp, over 150,000 troops at this spot in training. The boys are under canvas yet. We have had some very cold weather, just similar to our Canadian weather. Our battalion has been inspected by the King and Queen, also by Lord Kitchener and Lord Roberts. We have a fine body of men and the 27th received great praise for their fine conduct on their passage over. We expect to leave for the front at an early date. We also expect to go into their fine conduct on their passage over.

We expect to leave for the front at an early date. We also expect to go into huts shortly. We train hard and our training is a duplicate of what is going on at the front. The boys had a few days' leave and spent their time seeing England. The Canadians received a warm welcome in England and wherever they go are treated with great respect. There is very little sickness in camp. I must say that the County of Lambton should be proud of their representatives on the Canadian force, as the conduct and discipline of the men is the best. The boys wish all their friends good luck and will say good-bye for now.
