FREEDOMERS OF CHARLOTTE.

I have thought my answer to the false, inconsistent, and grossly personal communication of Captain Owen, after the late County Meeting, would have kept that worthy silent in future, forgetting, that

"Who shames a scribbler, break one cobweb thread, He spins the slight self pleasing thread anew, Destroy his life, or exultation in vain."

So of the gallant Captain, "He's at his dirty work again," and although I have neither talent, nor inclination to follow him through the low slang and Billingsgate, which distinguish his late as well as former communication. I do not mean to let him escape.

I charged him with a false, intentionally false account of the proceedings of the late County Meeting, and appealed to the Chairman, Secretary, and members of the Meeting for the confirmation of my charge. That charge still remains unanswered by Capt. Owen, and till it is, he must appear to you, what I would call an Old Man—it is not truth teller, however. Now, if he, by mean deception and base trickery, obtained the suffrages of many an unworthy Voter at the late General Election. If he came to the late County Meeting and because he had not influence to carry or repress single resolution, went from it to vent his spleen, disappointment and malice, in a palpably false account of that meeting; if he so acted in your own County and under your own notice, of what would he not be capable at a distance where the means of detection were not near at hand? Till he rebuts the charge of wilful falsehood, which I and others have made against his account of said meeting, he can never come before you as a man of truth or honor, even should you be willing to forget former offences. I dare him to the attempt, pledging myself to establish said charge not by secret manoeuvre, but by open and indubitable evidence.

In birth and education a gentleman, I feel it any thing but an honor to come in competition with Capt. Owen, but since he has appealed to those who know us both, I abide by the issue of such appeal. In this County, and in our respective places of residence, let the appeal be tried. In the County at large, after a residence of eighteen years, who will say, I pledged my word and broke it? what friend that trusted me, that I deceived him? what prison walls have ever echoed the groans of an innocent and unfortunate person suffering under an unjust and arbitrary act. In my neighborhood I can stand and say whose Ox, or whose Ass, or whose Gown have I taken, and he answered, "thou hast not defrauded nor oppressed us." No tongue of insipid flattery, or feeble age will heap "curse, death and dire" upon my head; but the child of poverty and of suffering haile me as a benefactor, and my neighbours as a friend. Now, Capt. Owen knows that the reverse of this is the feeling towards him, oppression marks his acts, deception his promises and towards him confidence is unknown. I deny that I have discovered any good quality in the gallant Captain, and am sure if I pretended to such a discovery I would lose the credit I have hitherto supported untarnished among you.

Till I had the misfortune to trust the gallant Captain, I had never occasion to speak well of myself, and if in my benevolence I did not habitually flatter my neighbours in words, but in deeds I did them all the good within my humble means, and they return me kindness and neighborly regard. I feel ashamed to be forced to speak so much of myself, but I am not the first whom Capt. Owen's machinations have forced to defend themselves against slander, as the annals of Naval Investigations, and other reports will show not much to the Captain's credit, I believe—void of truth, and like his master the malevolent accuser of those who trust him, he deals in wholesale slander, but in the end it always operates greater injury to himself than his victim—I assure myself of the gaudy result.

Whilst I despise his threats, I call your attention to a new falsehood in his late communication, "that I solicit your suffrages by my own shewing, on the principle 'that Swindling, Fraud and Forgery' give a claim to them." Now, he knows that I only used one of these words in speaking of the case of Lord Cochrane convicted by base means of Swindling; and I spoke of the case to show, not that swindling, fraud, and forgery, were qualifications for a Representative, but that wretches void of principle and honor might fabricate such evidence as might lead to the conviction even in a Court of Justice of noble and honorable men, like Lord Cochrane—and no man can better understand this than Capt. Owen, more particularly if he would call to mind the Troubridge affair. But I cited Lord Cochrane's case to show, that a virtuous and discerning constituency, as in his case, might see through the rillany of such a transaction, and that Parliamentary rule will permit the re-election to the same House, of the victim of such villany. The constituents of Lord Cochrane re-elected him, not because he was convicted of swindling, but because they felt fully satisfied that he was misrepresented, and the day came (that will never dawn on the gallant Captain, I fear) "when his righteousness was made clear as light, and his just dealing as the noon day," and the nation and the world applauded them for their proceedings. No man has a higher sense of the qualifications—both in principle and intelligence required in a Representative, than myself, but that Captain Owen does not possess them is a painful, or he would never have given the preposterous turn to my citation of the case of Lord Cochrane he has done. That is another striking mark of the double. That is another striking mark of the warped malignity of his mind, of a piece with his conduct, at the Sessions when he objected to an appointment to office, merely because the candidate bore the name of Thompson, a name, that (because he has basely injured) he greatly hates.

In the mean time, he remains the conjurer of

falsehood, for his late report of the proceedings of the County Meeting—till he refutes that charge (and if it be unfounded he can do so easily for the witnesses are living) he is unworthy further consideration. Let him retain his intrusive glory as your so-called Representative. His days are numbered, and your just indignation will convince him, that "He that worketh deceit, shall not dwell in the house, and he that stirreth up strife shall not tarry."

A few words more and I have done, at present, with the execrations Captain, and leave him alone in his glory.

"Light armed with points, antithesis and puns, While low slang and Billingsgate his familiar dress Support his front and tricks bring up the rear."

Why did he not, when speaking of the County Meeting tell you, that one for a similar purpose had been previously held in Saint Stephens, absolutely without my knowledge; this rendered a large one at Saint Andrews unnecessary; but to have mentioned this, would not have answered his purpose of personal abuse on me, or it proves the old saying true, that

"Who have short memories and do not know."
