FIRES AND ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

DR. FARREL said the present seemed an opportune time for him to move for the appointment of the two committees, which he had given notice a few days ago. The object of one was to enquire into the means of the disposal of the various towns throughout the Province for quelling fires and preserving life and property...

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of the people of Halifax and Nova Scotia in order that it should be learned as soon as possible.

The other committee which he hoped anything still more important that was the preservation of the public health. While this body and in the other local legislatures and the Dominion Parliament almost every conceivable subject was legislated upon, this subject was hardly ever heard of.

It was a well-known fact that during the last few years in England the House of Commons and the leading public men had given the subject a great deal of attention. It was now known that a large majority of syphilitic or contagious diseases were due to preventable causes within the reach of communities. It only remained therefore for communities where these existed, to put the machinery in order, to remove them. About four years ago local government boards were appointed in England, the whole country being divided into sanitary districts. These Boards with competent officers had great powers given them to remove the cause of epidemic diseases. He would not dwell upon these points in detail. Sanitary laws had been almost altogether neglected until within the last few years, and now we are beginning to feel the evil effects of that neglect.

He knew from his own knowledge of the City of Halifax, and from communication with medical men in different parts of the Province, that zymotic diseases, particularly diphtheria and scarlet fever, were very prevalent and he had no hesitation in saying that four-fifths of these cases might be prevented, or their fatalities might be prevented, by taking proper precautions. He did not wish to put the House to greater expense. He only hoped this session to introduce this subject to the attention of the Legislature and people. He thought the committee might take evidence on the subject of ventilation and drainage and the method of building, and show the people that the condition of things which led to the prevalence of those diseases was remediable. The inquiry might be continued during the recess or if not then at some future time. Perhaps among the standing committees of the House a sanitary committee would hereafter be appointed as one of the most important that could be named by the House.

DEXTER, Me., Feb. 23.—Last evening J. W. Barron, the Treasurer of the Dexter Savings Bank, not returning home usual, search was made for him at the bank. After breaking open the doors, they heard a groaning in the vault in which he was locked. On obtaining entrance he was found lying hand-cuffed, gagged, and with a rope around his neck.
