QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON FORESTRY

(By Canadian Forestry Association)

Q. Has the forest fire menace been as serious this year as last.

A. Fully as serious up to June 5th, the date of writing. More than sixty fires were burning in Quebec at one time just a few days ago. The chief causes were trappers, smokers and fishermen. Camp fires have already got in much deadly work. An unextinguished camp fire is about the worst menace to the forests of Canada that has yet been found.

Q. Much is being published in the papers advocating an embargo on shipments of unmanufactured pulp wood by Canadian farmers to United States mills. What is the real meaning of this?

A. The advocates of the embargo claim that one million cords of raw wood shipped out of Canada, (chiefly Quebec) each year are keeping alive a number of United States mills which otherwise would transfer their industries and their payroll to Canada. They claim that this drains on Canada's forests, with relatively little profit to the country is weakening the support of our present and potential pulp, paper and lumber industries and that in the national interest it should be stopped.

Q. Will the reductions in the Dominion Air Board appropriations this year cut off the aerial forest patrols which they started two years ago?

A. We understand that there will be fully as much flying work in forest fire detection and photographic survey this year as last. The Ontario Government has arranged to carry on considerable aerial work on its own behalf through a commercial seaplane company. The work of the Air Board was invaluable to the development of forestry work throughout Canada and now with reduced appropriations commercial companies are taking up contracts with governments and pulp and paper corporations.

Q. I have undertaken to organize a Memorial Tree Planting campaign on behalf of our chapter of the Daughters of the Empire. How can I find out what trees to plant, and how to care for them?

A. The Canadian Forestry Association, Ottawa, has undertaken to supply free instruction to all organizations willing to plant memorial trees for Canada's soldiers.
