We clip the following items from the *North British Agriculturist*.

**AN ENGLISH SHORT-HORN HEIFER FOR AMERICA.**—We are informed that Mr. Craig, from Canada, has purchased the fine roan heifer "Waterloo I," two years and six months old, from Sir W. C. Trevelyan. This finely developed heifer was bred by the Rev. J. Jefferson, Thicket Priory, is of good Bates blood, got the first prize at Newcastle show last week, and cost nearly 300 guineas.

**THE KINNELLAR HERD OF SHORT-HORNS.**—Mr. S. Campbell, Kinnellar, Aberdeenshire, whose cow, Goldendrop, exported three years ago, has been, with her progeny, very popular in America, has just sold five cows and heifers of his own breeding, to Mr. Isaac Bowman, Canada West, who is to take them across the Atlantic soon. The lot includes the promising two-year-old heifer, Goldendrop 4th, which got the second prize at Aberdeen last week, and was sold for 100 guineas.

**SALE OF AN ENGLISH SHORT-HORN BULL.**—Mr. Thomas Easton, Torry, Dunfermline, has purchased one of the finest yearling Short-horn bulls of his day, from the breeder, Mr. R. Jefferson, Preston Howes, Whitehaven, Cumberland, for Mr. Snell, Ontario, Canada. The young bull has for sire, Knight of the Shire, by Commander in Chief. The dam is Village Rose, who was also the dam of the famous Irish prize-winning bull Sovereign. With so much Booth blood in the bull's veins he is a good bargain, even at the high price at which he has been sold.

A CLYDESDALE mare, exhibited at a recent agricultural fair at Stirling, Scotland, was sold, for exportation to America, for the sum of \$2,000.

**SALE OF CLYDESDALES AT INVERNESS SHOW.**—Mr. Leitch, Inchtellie, Forres, sold his ponderous bay stallion, Johnnie Cope, to Mr. Drummond, Blacklaw, Dunfermline, at 400 guineas. The animal has been resold to go to Canada. Mr. Leitch, we were informed, offered 300 guineas for Mr. Buchanan's magnificent three-year-old filly, but to no purpose. Mr. Robert Walker, factor, Altyre, bought Mr. Riddell's first-prize one-year-old entire colt, at a handsome figure. Mr. Bruce, Newton of Struthers, sold a two-year-old entire colt of his own breeding, for American export, at 100 guineas. Mr. Murray, Fauchalds, Turfiff, sold one of the same age at a like price. Mr. Lawson, Deebank, disposed of his two-year-old colt, Major, for 170 guineas.

**GRAND PRIZES FOR WEST HIGHLAND CATTLE.**—At the Highland Show last week some sales of the ancient native breed of cattle were made at prices which compare favorably with those current for Short-horns, extravagant as the latter were. The first-prize two-year-old Highland bull shown and bred by Mr. Stewart, Bochart, Callander, was sold to Mr. Stewart, Duntulm, Skye, for 200 guineas. The same price was paid by a Welshman for the first prize yearling bull, shown and reared by Mr. Archibald Stewart of Ensay, Stornoway. The second-prize two-year-old bull, Royal George, the property of and bred by Lord Middleton, Applecross, was bought at a reasonable figure by Campbell Macpherson, Campbell of Bailliemore.

**THE SITTYTON HERD OF SHORT-HORNS.**—Mr. Cruickshank, Sittyton, Aberdeenshire, has sold from his celebrated herd within the last few weeks twenty Short-horn heifers and one bull, all for export to America. Six fine heifers go to Mr. Milne, Lockport, Illinois, United States, at an average of 160 guineas each. Fourteen heifers and a bull go to different buyers in Canada, and range in price from 120 guineas downwards.

**LORD STRATHMORE'S CLYDESDALES AND SHROPSHIRE.**—There are few finer studs of Clydesdales or flocks of Shropshires than are to be seen on Lord Strathmore's home farm at Glamis, Forfarshire. His lordship's second-prize two-year-old filly at the late Inverness Show, has been sold to Mr. Beattie, Canada, for 130 guineas. The same buyer and importer also purchased the noble Earl's prize pen of Shropshire gimmers at the recent show for 50 guineas.

**A REMNANT OF THE EARNHILL HERD OF SHORT-HORNS.**—Only two or three remnants of the Earnhill herd of Short-horns, dispersed two or three years ago, have been in Mr. Harris's possession for some time. One of these, a remarkably fine roan two-year-old heifer descended from Duke of Tyne, was shown by the breeder in the extra stock class at Inverness, and was there fancied by a plucky Canadian buyer and breeder, Mr. Stanton, who ultimately obtained the animal for 200 guineas.

**THE UPPER MILL SHORT-HORNS.**—Mr. Marr, Uppermill, Aberdeenshire, who has taken more prizes at the national show the last two years than any northern exhibitor of Short-horns, and whose herd is growing in excellence as well as numbers, sold his cup bull at Aberdeen to Mr. Cran, Kirkton, Inverness, for 200 guineas; his second-prize two-year-old heifer at Inverness, to go to Canada, at 150 guineas; and his first-prize yearling heifer at the Highland capital to Mr. Stanton, Ontario, for 120 guineas.

**THE SANDHOLE SHORT-HORNS.**—Mr. Stewart, Sandhole, Fraserburgh, who has reared some good Short-horns in recent years, has sold the five-year-old massive, strong loined, excellent quartered bull Alliance, bred at Sittyton, and the second prize winner at Stirling last year, to Mr. Tolmie, Baspardine, Fort-George, at a high price. For the stall thus vacated at Sandhole, Mr. Stewart has bought the well-fleshed, strong-backed roan bull with which Mr. Buchanan, Whitehouse, Stirling, got the cup at the late Stirling show. This animal was bred by Mr. Lawson, Old Mills, Elgin, and is after Vampire, a Sittyton bull.

**THE EARL OF FIFE'S POLLED HERD.**—The very handsome three-year-old polled Angus bull which, this year and last, gained for the breeder, Mr. Bowie, Mains of Kellie, Arbroath, the first prizes at the Highland Society's shows, has been secured for the valuable and now all but invincible herd owned by the Earl of Fife at Duff House farm, Banff. On the other hand, Mr. Bowie has purchased from his lordship a promising two-year-old heifer named Fancy of Corskie, and bred by Lord Fife. She got second honors at Aberdeen, and looks likely to turn out a good cow.

Mr. W. Wilson, formerly of Balquharn, Alford, now of Hill House, Hoddlesdon, Hert, has gained the cup and first prize, value £15 15s. for the best thoroughbred stallion at the East of England Great Horse Show. The *Bury Free Press* says: "The thoroughbred and hackney stallions were also good classes, the whole which were entered being commended or highly commended. Mr. Wilson's thoroughbred horse, Hotshot, was much admired, and some persons considered it one of the strongest and handsomest blood horses that have been exhibited for some time past. It is rare one sees such bone, substance and action on a horse of this breed."

**THE KIRKTON (INVERNESS) SHORT-HORNS.**—Mr. Cran, Kirkton, Inverness, exhibited three Short-horn cows and a heifer with creditable success, as noticed elsewhere, at the Inverness Show, and he sold the four for nearly 500 guineas. His third-prize two-year-old heifer, bred by Mr. Marr, Uppermill, descended from Heir of Englishman, goes to Mr. Beattie of Canada, at 100 guineas. His third-prize cow, bred by Mr. Dathie, Collynie, Tarves, and a handsome four-year-old roan, of his own breeding, were bought by Mr. Thomson, Canada, for 250 guineas; and his splendid roan five-year-old cow, Sophia Alice, bred by Mr. Bruce, Newton of Struthers, and the winner of highest local honors, has passed into the possession of Mr. Dathie, Collynie, Tarves, Aberdeen, at 120 guineas. There is every prospect of 2nd Earl Derby, bred by Mr. Wiley, Barnaby, Yorkshire, which gained for Mr. Marr, Uppermill, the third prize at Inverness, proving a decided acquisition to the Kirkton herd. Mr. Cran bought him last week at 200 guineas.—*N. B. Agriculturist*.
