The Rev. Professor Lillie and the Hev. Mr. Wickson, the De putation of the Congregational Union of Canada Wost, were intreduced to the Synod by Mr. Jennings, and were condially welcomed by the Moderator.

The Reverent the Depaties then severally addressed the Syand. reciprocating the sontiments of unity in the faith, and of respect and biotherly regard with which they were received by the

Mederator.

Measts. Konnady and McClure addressed the Deputation on

behalf of the Synod.

The Synod then engaged in preise by singing the 193rd Pealm; and at the request of the Moderator the Rev. Mr. Lillie led in

The Moderntor than rend the 17th chapter of the Gospal according to St. John and the Rev. Professor Taylor angaged in

On motion of Mr. Dick, the Rev. Professor Lillie and the Rev. Mr. Wickson were invited to correspond and take their scate in Court.

The Committee on Correspondence with the Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia, reported the copy of a letter transmitted by them to that Church.

The draft of lotter read was highly approved; the thanks of the Synod were given to the Committee for their diligence; and they were instructed to propare extends from the letter for publication in the Canadian Prosbyterian Magnzine.
The Committee on the Nova Scotia Correspondence were then

reappointed, consisting of Mosses. Jonnings, Thornton, Dick, and

Fraset.

The Convener of the Committee of Missions having stated that the Rev. Mr. Sinclair desired to olunin leave of absence for some time, to visit his friends in the United States, the Synod decided that for reasons which do not affect the ministerial standing of Mr. Sinclair as a probationer, nor his moral character; and as the term of six months for which he was received is expired, he be now relieved from all obligation of further service to this Church; and that the Presbytery of Toronto, by which he was received, be instructed to give him historical testimonials of his connexion

with this Church, and of the termination of that connexion.
On motion of Dr. W. Taylor, it was agreed to ranew the recommendation that Collections be made in all our congregations for the French Canadian Missionary Society.

Took up the question of the vacancies of the Church and the

inadequate supply of proachers, when

It was moved by Mr. Drummond, seconded by Mr. Portsous, That the Synod, taking into consideration the many obligations under which it lies to the parent Church for the many substantial tokens of bemedicace and kindness which it has given to it, takes this opportunity of expressing its cordial thanks for these; taking also into consideration the great scarcity of Proschers, and also the urgent calls from the many vecant congregations for settled pastors, agrees carnestly to solicit the co-operation of the Mission Board in Scotland, with a view to secure the services of at least ten additional preachers; and that this object he the more speedily gained, agree to appoint a deputy to repair to Scotland to consult with the Mission Board, and take what other steps may be deemed necessary to carry this resolution into effect.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Proudfoot, seconded by

Mr. Aitken.

That the last clause, after the word "pronchers," commencing with "and that this object," to the end, be omitted.

The amendment was first put and carried, and the motion, as amended, was then adopted.

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that the Rev. Mr. Waddell had demitted the charge of the congregation of Pickering, and that his name had been taken from the Roll of Presbytery. It ras thereupon taken from the Roll of Synod.

Was thereupon taken from the months of the seat Mr. Waddell was then invited to correspond, and take his seat

On motion of Mr. Aitken, seconded by Mr. McClure, it was resolved,

. That this Synod authorize the use, in public worship, of the Hymn Book sanctioned by the parent church, in any of the congregations under their shares disposed to introduce it.

The Committee to whom was referred the Overture from the Presbytery of Durham, in relation to the Clergy Reserves, reported d recommended to the Synod the adoption of the following Resolutions, viz:-

2. With respect to the general principles involved in the Clergy Reserved question; the Bynod deem it sufficient to refer to Deliverances on this subject, subject in records of their 18th and 16th nessions, as explanates y of their mentiments, and is declare their multered adhesion to the eliverance in the characteristic between their multered adhesion to the Bynod agree to express their natisfaction, that the whole question of the Clergy Reserves has by the action of the lamparial Government, been left earliest at the disposal of the Provincial Lagislature...

3. Under the new report which the question has thus assumed, the Frued feet called, in the trees emphatic manner, to declare, that no ad-parament of that question can be regarded as antisferency, which shall be anded on a more extended division of the Clerky Reserves, among the different religious des uninations, or which shall not embrace, as an eswaring element, the attendure and definitive specialisms of those Remeres to observe parely secular

4. The Syand renew the resonantendations of former yours to the agregations under these care, dispersiy to use all legitimate means, and streamenty to exert the influence processed by them in their streat to found time, with a view to secure, as specially as preside, the settlement of this question, in a manacr accordant with the well Arguen principles of this Church. Adopted.

The Presbytery of Durham reported on the inspection of Students of Theology in their bounds, to the following effect :-

That they have had under their impaction, as students, Poists. The date, McNethe, and McFael; their impaction, as students, McNethe, and McFael; that the two former have had several exercises assigned them, and have given the Proshytery uniform satisfaction. In regard to Mr. McFaul, the Proshytery have never had him before them, in consequence of ill health.

The Committee for the distribution of Preachers, consisting of

Mesers. Thornton and Rennedy, was now appointed.

The accounts were approved; and the cordial thanks of the Synod were given to the Transurer for his diligence and attention to the business entrusted to him.

Olderd. That the Trespirer's accounts, in detail, be printed as an appendix to the minutes; and that the editor of the Canadian Presbyterian Alacazine" be requisited to insect the accounts in that periodical.

On motion, it was agreed

That the Synwi's Treasurers be instructed to close their accounts on the 20th day of May, or on the first lawfel day thereafter. And the members of Seand are hereby instructed to attend to the regular collections required by Synod for the various schomes of the Church, at the Graner Limes

On motion, it was resolved

That the Committee of Hissions be instructed to supplement weak settied a-rayregations from the funds raised in this Province, so far as they ara nde anie.

On motion, it was agreed

That the Committee of Wissions be instructed, without delay, to correspond with the Alieston Board of the parent church, with a view to carrying out the earnest desire of this Synod for a further supply of Preachers, as expressed in the resolution of a former Sederant.

On motion, it was resolved,
That the Trespurer be submitted to pay the sum of £10 of Idbrary funds in his hands to the Committee on Theological Education, to be expended by them for behoof of the Library of the Theological Institute. On motion of Mr. Jennings, it was unanimously agreed. That the salary of the Clork of Syned be beneaforth £15 per annum.

Called for the Reports of Presbyteries on the employment in missionary labor of Ministers whose congregations receive aid from the Hission Fund.

The Presbytery of Flamboro gave in their Report as followsnamaly :

Report of Missionary labor for the past year, furnished by the Flambors' Presbylery.

The Ray. Mr. Radgers is the only Minister who has performed Misaionary labor in the bounds of this Presbytery during the past year. His services have been confined to Norwichville and Tilsinburgh. He has preached on ten different Sabhatha in Norwichville, and seven times on week days, and has visited all the families connected with our church in that locality. He has also preached and visited repeatedly in Tilein-burgh. The Presbytery believe that much good has been done by Mr. Rodgers as a Missionary, both as regards the interests of the United Prochyterian Church and the interests of vital religion; and they confidently believe that the seed sown will yelld produce a plentiful harvest.

The Presbytery of London reported, that they had no person employed in that service during the past year.

The Prosbytery of Toronto reported, that they had not employed any Minister in Missionary labor during the past year, because they did not see cause.

The Clerk of the Presbytery of Canada East being absent,

there was no report from that Presbytery.

The Lanark Presbytery reported, that none of its members had been employed in missionary labor during the past year.

The Presbytery of Durham reported, that they had not employed any of their Ministers in this service for the last year.

The Preshytery of Wellington reported, that none of their Ministers are in receipt of aid from the Mission Fund: and that therefore they had no report to make of such Missionary labour performed.

Called for the Reports of Presbyteries on the inspection of

Students of Theology.

The Presbytery of Toronto reported as follows:

The Toronto Presbytery beg leave to report, that they had under their impection the following students—namely, Mosers. Less, Fotheringham
