PRONUNCIATION.

How is the word Volapük pronounced? Anser, vola pe:k. It is a rule, without excep'n of cours, that the last sylabl has accent in Volapük. Ther is then no need to denote it. We must hav a fixt and definit Nota'n by which to indicate pronuncia'n with filosofic acuracy in these pages. In now undertaking to develop such, we dout if we can do beter than take the word Volapük as the text for a first lesn. The sign E denotes close i (as in machine). Two dots foloing Eindicate that while utering E the lips ar to be protruded, much as in whisling but to les degree. Normaly, lips ar retracted to giv the oral vocal tube its minimum of length in close i. This protru'n modifies the sound as certnly as varying a horn's length modifies its note. The sign (:) may be taken to symbolize the protruding lips. While les symbolic, it is neater to place the sign above (as, E). Doing so in riting may be preferabl; but in print objec'ns apear: (1)we hav alredy a use establisht for two dots over a vowel, calld dieresis, denoting that two consecutiv vowel-signs ar to be sounded separatly, as in orthocpy, preeminent, coordinat, etc. (2) These markt leters (ä, ë, ï, ö, ü) ar not comon in our printing-offices. The hyfen is made to do duty for them; as, pre-eminent. The colon (:) is always at hand. (3) Other nations hav these markt leters, mostly for a diferent purpos. In German, ä, ö, ü, ar used to denote sounds diferent from simpl a, o, u—in other words, they ar diacritic. Volapük uses ä, ö, ü, a, o, u, as in German; its inventer, Father Schleyer, is a German, and so it has a cast decidedly German. Wer our speling so far mended that we wud not hav two vowel-signs for one vowel-sound, the dieresis wud not be necesary—one minor advantage of many. The compositor who sets up most of these pages has been instructed to omit dieresis generaly—a harbinger of a beter time to come. To sum up, let: denote labial protrusion. One vowel, close $u(\bar{\mathbf{u}})$, is always uterd with protruded lips; so that puting the sign (:) after it is a work of supererogation. With u, maximum protru'n ocurs when under accent. With open u_i (u as in put), protrusion always ocurs with accent. That it always ocurs without accent, is doutful. With u and ū, then, protru'n is implied generaly.
