CATHOLICITY IN SCOTLAND SINCE THE REFORMATION.

Austin Oates, K.S.G., in a second article in the New Ern says: John Knox and November, 1572. devoting his last booments and breath to the curring of these of his associates whose share of Catholic plunder he considered was out of all equitable proportion to his own. This is scarcely the place to attempt an appreciation of John Knox's character and conquet. Undoubtedly he played a promised part in the foundation of Protestantism in Scotland. Prominent parts are not necessarily the most honorable, though frequently incrative. Knox had nothing to complain of the inter. The warmest friends and supporter of Protestantism fall to attribute to him a justifying title to the former.

In 1594 the Catholic nobles under the Earl of Huntly made a successful effort against the Lords of the Congregation, utterly routing Argyl's troops at Glenilvat, but the young King Janges VI., espousing the cause of the Kirk, Huntly's stronghold was stormed and he sought safety beyond the seas. When James assumed the English throne his sympatities with the contending religious actions in Scotland seem to have be in with the Episcopalians.
