By the death of Rev. Father Augustine Fatcher, which occurred at Kensington on 31st May, 1900, the Carmelite Order has lost a venerable and beloved member. James Stanssell Fricher was born at Taunton, Somerest, in April, 1822. Ills father, deeply impressed by the diametrically opposed teaching of some of the Church of England ministers, sought the advice of the late Canon Mitchell, rector of St. George's Church, who, without difficulty, convinced the conscientious inquirer after Truth of the Just claims of the Catholic Church But, unfortunately, Mr. Fatcher was carried off by illness before he was able to make his formal submission to the only true church of Christ. His eldest son, however, whose loss we now mourn, was in due time received into the fold, and had the happliness of seeing his mother, his brother and his sister following in his footsteps. He had received his education at St. James' School, Taunton, and was apprenticed in a contineral house of his native town, but together with the call of the Catholic Church he perceived the vocation to the roligious life. Accordingly, he entered the Carmelite Novitate at Kensington, exchanged his name for that of Brother Augustine of Jesus Cruelfied, and took his vows on 16th June, 1872. He passed through an excellent course of studies at the College of the Order of Renns, and having been ordained pright on 22nd December, 1878, returned to Kensington, where he excrelesed the sacual ministry for about two years.
