Messrs. Churchill & Sim, in their last report regarding the imports in to London, say

Of pine deals from the St. Lawrence the import has been 1,005,000 pieces, against 408,000 pieces in 1900; and of against 408,000 pieces in 1900; and of spruce deals 1,443,000 pieces, against 1,159,000 pieces in 1900. From New Bruhswick the import of pine deals has been 176,000 pieces, while last year there were no imports. Spruce deals have been imported to the extent of 244,000 pieces, and birch planks to 108,000 pieces, against 404,000 and 51,000 pieces respectively last yerr

The stock of pine deals has accumulated somewhat, and while prices of the lower qualities are still high, those obtainable for first quality have greatly fuctuated The fact is that a great' many shipments have found their way to this country which have not been too carefully culled for qual-ity and much trouble has resulted with buyers in consequence. What is called the new culling of pine deals may eventually be understood by buyers, but meanwhile those shippers who have kept to the recognized standards of quality will have less competition to face than formerly.

Spruce deals have been in good demand, and the importation has been a light one. Hardwoods generally have heen slow of sale.

ANNUAL LOG SALE.

The annual sale of mixed and unmarked logs raited by the Fredericton Boom Company was held at Frederic. ton, N.B., last week. There was a large attendance of lumbermen.

The Boorn Company has raited about 81,500,000 superficial feet of lumber this season, of which 827,680 feet, about I per cent., were not marked or the marks were not recog-nizable. This is the usual percentage.

The logs sold were made up of 33,-640 feet of hemlock, 22.820 feet of pine, 102,750 feet of cedar, and 758,.

Towage to St. John will cost 60 cents a thousand, so that Mr. Moore's logs will stand him \$12.50 a thousand feet at his mill, for merchantable. He gets the battens at two-thirds the price paid for the merchatable, and the condemned for nothing except the cost of towing. Spruce deals are selling at about \$10 a thousand feet.
