The custodians of Capital may abuse their position and grind the faces of labourers; and, labourers may form trades-unions and organize strikes; but, abour and capital will not quarrel any more than man will quariel with his meals. Cheapside believes in paying labour handsomely, as no country can be prosperous without well paid labourers.
