by fishermen and town councils concerning lamprey control and the erection of barriers in rivers flowing into lake Huron and Georgian bay. The policy at the present time is to endeavour to eradicate the lamprey in lake Superior and thus preserve the lake trout stocks in that lake. If this proves successful, then efforts will be made toward the eradication of the sea lamprey in the other lakes. It is expected that the great lakes fisheries commission soon will be seized with the responsibility of lamprey control. At that time these representations will be brought to the attention of the commission.

I might also point out that the time for the erection of barricades in the rivers for this year has passed, and that by next year we hope the commission rather than the Department of Fisheries will be doing this work.

LOBSTERS—REQUEST FOR FALL SEASON IN AREA 7B, NEW BRUNSWICK

On the orders of the day:

Mr. H. J. Robichaud (Gloucester): In the absence of the Minister of Fisheries, I should like to direct a question to the parliamentary assistant. In view of the small catch of lobsters reported for the spring fishing season which closed on June 30, can the parliamentary assistant inform the house whether the department is prepared to consider requests from individual fishermen or groups of fishermen and from the municipal council of Gloucester county, asking for the granting of a one month fall season extending from September 10 to October 10 for lobster fishing district 7B?

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught (Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries): I wish to thank the hon. member for having given me notice of his intention to ask this question.

The department is prepared at any time to consider requests from individuals or groups of fishermen for changes in the regulations. Our officials have been present at meetings where this was discussed, and it has also been brought to our attention by representatives from other constituencies. For this reason we have investigated the problem.

I have a statement here showing the catches of lobster in district 7B for 1954 and 1955, together with a summary of the catches in the provinces and counties. Since this statement is quite long, too long to read, I should like the permission of the house to place it on *Hansard*.

Some hon. Members: Agreed.
