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National Energy Board made any studies to see whether these increases, particularly the 40 per cent increase effective August 1, are warranted? Does the government intend to take any steps to roll back this price if, as a result of their studies, they find the increase was not justified?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, on the basis of the statement by the spokesman for the oil industry in respect of recent increases, they have acknowledged that they were really only to keep pace with increases in the international prices. In other words, there has been no suggestion on their part that these increases are related to cost increases incurred in Canada. It is for this reason that the general approach there is related to a change in circumstances. The windfall that is occurring here is such that we feel there should be an introduction of either an export tax or possibly an oil marketing board so the windfall would be to the benefit of a wider public.

Mr. Speaker: The Chair will recognize the hon. member for his second and last supplementary question, followed by the hon. member for Shefford and the hon. member for Fundy-Royal.

Mr. Douglas: Mr. Speaker, I thank the minister for his answer which justifies the position we have taken in asking for a two-price system. I should like to ask the minister whether, in view of the statement he has just made, his government is merely going to freeze this escalated price, or does it propose to take any steps to urge the oil industry, or ask parliament for legislative authority, to roll this price back?

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): Mr. Speaker, I think it is fair to point out that there is a combines proceeding under way against the oil industry in relation to this increase. It would not be my intention to seek legislation in order to return prices to the levels of a year ago.

In spite of further research, we still have not found an equitable way to redeem the bonds.
