## NATIONAL DEFENCE—BREAKDOWN BY PROVINCE OF EXPENDITURES

### Question No. 2,619-Mr. Forrestall:

What was the breakdown, by province, for dollar expenditure by the Department of National Defence, in each fiscal year 1965 to the present, inclusive?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): Prior to 1967 the Department of National Defence did not maintain its budgetary records in such a way as to readily identify the breakdown of departmental expenditures by province.

Also excluded in the distribution are the government contributions to the superannuation account, death benefit and CPP. However, pension payments from non-budgetary funds to pensioners resident in the various provinces is included in this distribution.

(2) The distribution by province shown in column (e) is taken from the statement of expenditures by province for 1971-72 provided to the Miscellaneous Estimates Committee on 13 April, 1973. The amounts shown in this column are based on a distribution of all DND budgetary expenditures without the adjustments for military payroll deduc-

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): The following percentages, by year, since 1968, represent the dollar proportion of the total Department of National Defence Budget spent outside Canada: 1967-68, 12.5 per cent; 1968-69, 10.9 per cent; 1969-70, 10.7 per cent; 1970-71, 8.9 per cent; 1971-72, 9.1 per cent.

#### Question No. 2,621-Mr. Forrestall:

- 1. On what date does the government and the Department of National Defence intend to complete the translation and publication of bilingual reprints of the Canadian Forces Administrative Orders?
- 2. At what level has funding for this program been provided for the 1973-74 fiscal year?
  - 3. What percentage of such orders has been completed to date?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): 1. All new CFAO's are published in both official languages. When a current CFAO requires amendment it is republished in both official languages. It is estimated that all such Orders will be in both official languages within two years.

#### Question No. 2,622—Mr. Forrestall:

- 1. Since January 1, 1973, how many men or officers have been released from Maritime Command?
- 2. For each calendar year between 1964 and 1972, inclusive, how many men or officers were released, by command, from the Canadian Armed Forces?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): 1. The number of personnel who have left Maritime Command for one reason or another since January 1, 1973, is as follows: (a) Officers, 121; (b) Other Ranks, 910; Total 1.031.

2. Records of termination of service for all reasons prior to 1968 are incomplete. From 1968 to 1972 terminations of service from each Command and personnel accounting unit are as follows:
