ST. MIKES TAKE OPENED HANDILY

Peterboro Beaten in O. H. A.
Senior Game—St. Mikes
Masters at All Times—
Petes Will Be Good.

The O. H. A. season got its official opening when St. Michaels handed Peterboro seniors a 17-0-0 beating at the arena last night.

The crew from down east were lost on the big ice, but they were game every inch and have a much better team than the score would indicate. Kelly at right wing was head and shoulders over any wing man on the ice. The back row was on top of every play and checked back in grand style.

Rankin and Laflamme had it all to themselves in the first half and left the rest of the bunch standing still. Jerry tried to get away with the leading in front of the net, but he was stopped by when Referee Caldwell gave him a couple of trips to the fence.

Frank Rankin is easily the best rover playing senior hockey, and he ably demonstrated it last night. Frank corralled ten of St. Mikes' seventeen counters.

Peterboro have a nice, speedy little team, and they have a good combination style. Time after time they would go down the ice, but the St. Michaels defence were on the job, and their shots were always blocked.

Peter Spratt is a finished defence man and has a nice turn of speed when he takes a notion to travel down the ice. It was a clean battle, with few penalties, the St. Mikes being the chief offenders.

It was a fast game through, despite the one-sided score, and the green shirts will find Peterboro hard to beat on their own ice.

In the first half Peterboro couldn't get inside of the great defence and were shooting from centre ice. Bore in as they would, Murphy and Disette chased them into the corner, and when Bricker did get a lift to turn aside it was of the easy kind.

It was poor ice again, and for the first half the west side of the rink was very sticky. Peterboro forwards slowed up every time they hit the bad spots, and time after time lost the puck when it failed to slide thru the slush.

St. Michaels gave a pretty exhibition of the combination game, with three and at times four men. They would go down the ice, spread out nicely, and the passes were of the perfect order.

With Herbie Mathews out with a lame shoulder, Bricker Gordon was moved over to the right side, and Richardson held down the left wing job. Gordon seemed just as much at home at right and gave a good account of himself.

Frank Rankin was the busiest little man on the ice at the start, and netted five goals before Peterboro could get the hands of the rink. Frank's speed was wonderful, and he waded right in, going thru the defence and getting his scores from right on top of the goalkeepers.

Peterboro tried badly before the half-time whistle blew, but St. Mikes never let up and kept slipping them past Dwyer so fast it was hard to keep track of them. The first half netted St. Mikes 11, while Peterboro had failed to get a single goal.

The second half saw Peterboro play with renewed vigor and it was much speedier than the early part of the game. They checked back harder, and gave Bricker some real shots to stop. St. Mikes' defence were not so effective and

Park and Kelly got their time after time. Hard luck camped on the trail of the eastern boys. A three-man combination worked nicely and it got them two goals. Again they came and St. Mikes kept plugging along and four more were added before full time blew.

Peterboro have been handicapped owing to the lack of ice in their home town and only had two workouts before the game. St. Michaels, when they get some much needed practice they should round out a nice little team and they will be hard to beat on their own rink.

Their forward line is fast and every man has good stickhandling. St. Mikes have a little better team in the back end, but on them on the defence and Bricker is a little better than any rover in the back end.

The St. Michaels' team as it lined up last night can hardly be improved upon. Rankin and Laflamme are the two fastest counter men playing O.H.A., and Gordon and Richardson are two hard-checking wings that have speed. Big Murphy and Disette are a sure defence and every body knows what Bricker can do in goal.

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—The Ottawa Cricket Club are in receipt of a letter from R. B. Benjamin, manager of the Australian cricket team, which is to tour Canada this summer. The Australians are willing to play a two-days' game in Ottawa on the condition that they receive a guarantee of \$1000, or a three-days' game for \$1500. As the local cricketers are without any source of revenue, the games being free, it is doubtful if they will see their way clear to have the visiting team play in the capital.
