## IMPORTANT WEEK IN LEGISLATURE

Bill to Extend Votes to Women Will Be Introduced Today.

## TEMPERANCE DEBATE

Wednesday Will Be Devoted to Arguments on Repeal Question.

The present week in the legislature augurs well to be the most important, not to say the most interesting of the present session. This afternoon a bill to extend the franchise for voting on representatives to the legislature to all women now entitled to vote in municipal elections will be introduced by Wm. Macdonald of Centre Bruce, and it is expected that the division will be taken today.

Tomorrow the budget debate will be resumed. It is understood the opposition will bring in an important amendment dealing with the financial administration of the government. Unless the debate is too long, both Mr. Rowell and Sir James Whitney will speak.

On Wednesday the temperance debate will be continued and will be closed by an important speech by Mr. Rowell. As it is understood that the Conservatives are to hold a caucus Wednesday morning, it is not unlikely that the premier will announce the new government proposals forehanded in the speech of the provincial secretary last week. This promises to be a more interesting afternoon for the temperance interests than the opening of the debate last Wednesday.

Should the budget occupy more time than an afternoon, it will come up again Thursday, and if the leaders have not yet spoken, they will do so then. If time permits, the opposition will open fire on the Factory Act and amendments in favor of women and children employees. If the afternoon is taken up with speeches on the budget, the Factory Act debate will be set for Friday.

It was learned last night that Leader Rowell of the opposition has recovered from his cold and expects to be in good speaking trim for the heavy week before him in the legislature.

## STRIKERS PLANNED TO WRECK TRAINS

Such Is Testimony of Detective Dealing With Virginian Coal Troubles.

## SOLDIERS IMPERILED

But "Yellow Streak" Complained of by Leader, Saved Lives.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., March 9.—(Can. Press.)—That efforts were made to wreck trains conveying soldiers to the Kanawha County strike region, and to destroy property, was the testimony today of Frank C. Smith, detective, at the trial before the military commission of 49 persons charged with conspiracy during the recent riots in the coal fields.

Smith stated that he had spent five months in the mining region representing himself either as an organizer of miners or as an employee of an electric company. During his testimony he named persons and incidents without hesitancy, and frequently when he pointed to some of the defendants he secured a bow as recognition of the truth of his statements.

Only once did anyone question his testimony, and that was when Smith named one of the defendants as being with him on their march from a camp at Holley Grove to Hansford, for the alleged purpose of "dynamiting" a train carrying soldiers. The defendant declared he was a hundred yards behind Smith in the march.

On another occasion he pointed out John W. Brown as the man who saved his life at Hansford when an armed crowd, while waiting for a troop train, became suspicious of the detective. Brown vowed for Smith and told him to leave.

Waited Three Days.  
According to Smith, armed men at Holley Grove, on Feb. 10, informed him that they had been waiting for three days for an opportunity to "wreck and shoot up" the train on which soldiers were being sent to the strike district.

He said that on Jan. 28 he was at Cheyan and heard "Mother" Jones tell the miners "they had a yellow streak in their backbones and ought to be beaten up by the mine guards for not resisting with all their might."

Smith was not permitted to testify against persons not on trial at this time. He had not finished his statement when court adjourned, and will resume on Monday.

R. L. Taylor, Emory Hoffman, and L. T. Hensley, testified regarding the riots at Mucklow and Ronda. They told of encountering armed men and of the wounding of several persons.

Thirty-nine of the 49 persons on trial filed a plea in abatement with the circuit court of appeals today, saying they did not want to be a party to the writ of prohibition recently asked for, and that they were satisfied that their trial before the military commission is being conducted in a fair and impartial manner.

TWO WEEKS' MISSION AT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH


Archdeacon Ingles Will Preach Tonight and Others Have Been Secured.

## KEEN BATTLE FOR FURS OF INDIANS

Hudson Bay Company Compelled to Establish New Northern Post.

COCHRANE, Ont., March 8.—(Special.)—The fight that has been going on for centuries between the fur traders and the gentlemen adventurers, the Hudson Bay Company, has been renewed with considerable keenness at Bell River, in northern Quebec, at a point where the Bell River crosses the transcontinental railway.

Had been finding that the toll of furs obtained from the Indians coming down the Bell and the Nottaway to Cochrane was getting lamentably small, and that the investigation they discovered that a little knot of free traders had established themselves at Bell River and were intercepting the Indians and getting the furs.

The worshipful company have therefore determined to establish a post right at Bell River and compete with the free traders on their own ground. This is a forward move on the part of the Hudson Bay Company, as hitherto, as the Indians have resented the advance of the company's colonization, they have abolished their posts and followed them. Now it is bidding for the trade that will undoubtedly spring up not only with the Indians but with the contractors or the Montreal and James Bay Railway when work commences on the Clergue road.

MOVE FOR RECAL OF FREDERICKS.

LOS ANGELES, March 8.—(Can. Press.)—A. J. Mooney, secretary of the Los Angeles Building Trades Council, announced tonight that plans were being perfected to attempt the recall of District Attorney John D. Fredericks, because of his attitude toward unions and because of his record in the chamber of deputies to raise the \$100,000,000 asked for by the government for additions to the French armaments by imposing an extra tax on incomes. Those above \$2000, he said, should be taxed heavily when there were no children in the family, while where were children, the tax should be decreased in proportion to their number.

Deputy Paul Pugliese-Conti brought forward an amendment to the bill proposing to pay a tax of \$25 on every foreigner working in France.
