# IN THE SMALL VEINS

Narrow Leads Carry Higher Values Than Wide Veins.

PORCUPINE CITY. March 31 .-(From Our Own Man Up North.)-Invariably, so far as work in the district values than the wider ones, values apparently being concentrated in the lesser area, and consequently less expensive in operating than compared

with the bigger value returned.
