

The original agreement with the To-ronto-Niagara Power Co. was for the development of 125,000 horsepower, buil during the last days of the Ross govduring the last days of the Ross gov-ernment this privilege was doubled, but whether the extension will be ratified by the legislature is as yet unknown. It was stipulated in this last agree-ment that one-half of the quantity (the additional 125,000 horsepower) gen-erated is specifically reserved for the use of the municipalities of Ontario, at rates to be fixed by the government, and that the new agreement is subject to the ratification and approval of the legislative assembly.







March Health Report.The monthly report of the provincial board of h-alth for March shows 261 deaths in divisions representing a population of 1.946,271, making a moriality rate of 14.9 in 1000, this being two points lower than the corresponding period of last year. There were 161 cases of smallpox to 48 last year, while the mortality from scarlet fever has eached the very low point of 4.7 per cent. Diphtheria has also reached a much lower death rate, being 12.1 per culosis caused the same number of deaths as reported last year in March being 200, or 69.5 per cent. of all the same number of deaths caused by infectious diseases.
