Fred Archer Rode Six Winners. J. Lee, the negro jockey, who rode winners at Churchill Downs the show. The winners: Wednesday, accomplished a task that no other American boy ever did. In the history of racing in the world there are only two records of jockeys having ridden the winner in every race in one day. Fred Archer and George Fordham, both English boys, accomplished this feat in England. Monk Overton, another negre rode six winners in one day at Washington Park, Chicago, 16 years ago, but there were seven races that day, and he had no mount in the seventh race. Several American lockeys have swept the card in flat races on the big tracks, but on the days when they

were so successful there were only 5 flat races, the other being a steeplechase event. Tod Sloan, Grover Cleve-land Fuller and Walter Miller are some of those who rode five winner in one day.
