

Austria-Hungary in the same decade raised her production from 653,000 tons to 1,050,000 tons, a gain of 61 per cent., and in France the increase has a gain of 163 per cent.-the increase for the whole of Europe during the same period being 78 per cent., and the production reaching the great total of 4,-792,000 tons. A vigorous attempt is now being made in the United States to establish the industry on this continent. The sugar daily order.
