### THE COMING CONFERENCE.

Sir Louis Davies and Sir Julian Pauncefote have been conferring in Washington with Messrs. John W. Foster and John A. Kasson with a view to making preliminary arrangements for the conference which is soon to take place for the purpose of settling all the differences that exist between Canada and the United States. Some of these differences are of long standing, and it is hardly likely that the commissioners of the two Governments will agree on every point, but there is no doubt that the Americans are coming to this conference in a much more amiable frame of mind than they have ever before brought to the discussion of Canadian questions. They have already shown a disposition to make concessions which would have excited surprise before the trouble with Spain began. They have granted full bonding privileges over their routes to the Klondike, and have given the Canadians in Alaska the same mining privileges that Americans enjoy in the Canadian Yukon. Only a short time ago they expected to get extraordinary concessions from Canada in return for these simple reciprocal courtesies. It is possible that the new treaty may provide that these mutual concessions in Alaska and the Canadian Yukon shall be lasting, and no doubt the whole question of bonding arrangements on all the international railway lines will be thoroughly discussed. A permanent arrangement as regards bonding would be at least as much to the advantage of the United States as of Canada.

The Behring Sea question has been a disturbing element for eleven years, and if the two countries can come to an amicable arrangement for the preservation of the seals, it will be a matter for gratification. The latest proposal of the United States was short and countries should prohibit the killing of seals for a year, but the Canadian Government replied that Canadian sealers would demand compensation for the suspension of their industry and that Parliament could not be induced to vote an amount sufficient to satisfy them.

The Atlantic fishery question is a much more important one to Canada than the Behring Sea seal matter. The Americans have wanted all the privileges of fishing in Canadian waters, buying bait and transshipping fish over Canadian railways without allowing Canadian fish to enter the United States free. Canadians have considered that in exchange for these privileges they should get free admission of fish to the American markets, and something to boot, as the Canadian fisheries are the most valuable in the world. It ought to be an easy matter to arrange for common fishery regulations in the great lakes.

A most important matter which should be easily arranged is reciprocity in coasting privileges. The Americans have refused to allow Canadian vessels to run from one American port to another. This should not be so. Perhaps the Canadian commissioners, by impressing upon the Americans the importance of the St. Lawrence route and its probable growth in the future as well as the immense development of the wheat regions in the Canadian Northwest, that is certain to come in the near future, might be able to convince them that it would be to their advantage to make reciprocal arrangements for coasting.

Perhaps the most irritating question for consideration is the Alien Labor Law of the United States. An hour's talk should settle this. The law was primarily intended to shut out the pauper labor of Europe, and it is not an intelligent, as well educated and as much accustomed to good living and equality as Americans. There is no reason why the law should apply to Canada, and the Americans in their present frame of mind ought to be able to see this.

As regards the trade question it is to be hoped that the Liberals have abandoned all idea of unrestricted reciprocity or anything like it, but the Canadian commissioners ought to be able to convince the Americans that unless they admit our lumber and refined nickel free of duty or at a low rate of duty, we must take immediate measures to protect ourselves. They might also be able to show that free admission of Canadian barley into the United States would be a fair return for free admission of American corn by Canada. There are some other natural products, including coal, that might pass freely between the two countries with advantage to both. On the whole there is reason to hope that a treaty of lasting benefit to both countries may be arranged.

## THE GRAVENHURST SANITARIUM.

Although the consumptive sanitarium is not situated in Toronto it is to all intents and purposes a Toronto institution. Toronto has an isolation hospital for contagious diseases and several hospitals for non-contagious cases. Consumption is a disease for the treatment of which we have no special hospital or sanitarium in Toronto. And yet of all diseases it is the one that demands the most careful and scientific treatment. Toronto is not very well adapted, climatically, for the location of a consumptive sanitarium. The institution has been placed in Gravenhurst because the Muskoka district has climatic advantages which Toronto does not possess. A strong case can be made out in favor of the request that has been made that the City Council should contribute towards the support of the Gravenhurst institution. The Western

and St. Michael's hospitals cover exactly the same ground as that covered by the General hospital, and yet each of these receives the same per diem allowance as that granted to the latter. There is even greater reason why the consumptive sanitarium should be officially recognized by the council than the Western hospital. No institution in this city and none other in the province covers the field of the Gravenhurst sanitarium. It is the only semi-public institution in Ontario where consumption is properly treated, and yet consumption is by long odds the most fatal and destructive of all diseases. The City Council would be fully justified in making some arrangement with the Gravenhurst institution, whereby indigent Toronto patients could be sent there and treated. Under existing conditions such patients have to take care of themselves as best they can, until their condition becomes so bad that they have to be sent to the General hospital, which is quite unsuited for them, while their presence in that institution is a source of danger to the other inmates. If we admit the principle that a municipality should help its indigent sick, then that help should be extended to the case that will accomplish the best results. If we are going to help indigent consumptives, every cent intended for that purpose should go to such an institution as the one at Gravenhurst in preference to any hospital located in this city.
