COMMITTEES AT WORK.

Three Public School Board Committees Did Business Yesterday—Old Chairs "Out of Style."

Three committees met yesterday afternoon in the Public School Board Room. Inspector Hughes reported to the Supply Committee. The number of books sent in to be repaired in June this year was 123, over 123 were returned after examination and 2137 were unit for further use, while 2701 were rebound. All the books condemned as unit were replaced from stock on hand, except 909 second readers, 30 third readers, 129 fourth readers and 100 public school readers. It was decided that the inspector's memorandum for further supplies be adopted. The committee passed numerous resolutions.

At the Property Committee Dr. Buck's motion, that the superintendent report upon the working of a new window washer, a sample of which should be placed in one of the office windows, was adopted. The superintendent recommended to the committee the dismissal of Caretaker Hobbs, Rose-ave, from the school, who had been dismissed for neglect of duty, but promised to be good in future. He was sent back to duty, on trial for two months.

At the Committee on Municipal Building Trustee Kent presided to consider the committee appointed to consider the question of the proposed new offices in the new City Hall. A list of reports was made out, including a new dais and chair, new committee table, new desks and new carpet. The chairs used by the trustees at present are substantial and comfortable, but were condemned as "out of style." Those now in use will be sent to the school principal.

McLean, dealing tackle and sporting goods, blew out the front of the structure today and set the building on fire. Three women jumped from the third storey windows and are dying. The explosion shattered plate glass windows in all the stores near by.

### GERMANY HAS BEEN WORKING.

For Fifteen Years She Has Been Endeavouring to Advance Her Interests in the Philippines.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 28.—The Evening Post reiterates its former stories regarding the supplying of arms to the Filipinos by the German Government, and is positive that its authority is absolutely correct. The Post published an interview with the informant today in which he says that he is not in a position to tell the full story, for the reason that he is financially interested in the plot, and has actually been a party to the scheme. He says that he is interested in the German-Philippine trade to the extent of nearly a million dollars, and that for 15 years, Germany has been working among the insurgents for her own benefit, and that there would have never been a revolution had it not been for the German Government. Continuing, he says:

"The arms that have been supplied came from the Imperial Government, and were furnished through the trading companies of which I am interested so as to conceal the German hand."

"The arms that are now being carried by the insurgents and German vessels are from the same source. Aguinaldo, who accepted a petty bribe, to desert the cause of the insurgents, has not the money to arm and equip a big army and it has taxed its resources to arm such supplies alone."

"My information is absolutely authentic. As it comes from high officials of the Government, who have large personal interests in the Philippine Islands. Germany is supplying the rifles, ammunition, the machine guns that are being landed, and when the insurgent army is fully armed and equipped and drilled, trouble will commence. America's safety lies in disarming the insurgents as a move towards the restoration of peace."

### THE OREGON GETS READY.

For Her Long Voyage—Will Start for the Pacific To-Day.

New York, Sept. 28.—The United States battleship Oregon went down from the Brooklyn navy yard and anchored off Tompkinsville this morning, preparatory to her start on the long voyage to the Pacific.

The Oregon draws more than two feet over her normal draught of 22 feet, and is over 30 feet in the water. Besides an enormous consignment of stores and provisions, she carries 1400 tons of coal and more than 500 tons of ammunition. In order to carry this amount of powder and shells a number of temporary magazines were constructed in her hold.

As the ship moved out from the dock at the navy yard band began to play "Home-ward Bound."

The Oregon will remain at Tompkinsville until tomorrow, when she is to be joined by the Iowa. The two will then begin their cruise to the Philippines.

### TOWN OF TREHERNE BURNED.

Fire Raged All Night and Destroyed Much Property.

Treherne, Man., Sept. 28.—A fire which started last night and is still raging has done a tremendous amount of damage to property here. Among those already burned out are the following: Alinsky's hotel, owned by the Molsons Bank; butcher shop of A. Ross; George Kearns' barber shop; Stranks' hardware; Alexander Co.'s bank; Andrew & Pithblado's office; Masonic lodge-room; over the bank, and a dwelling house; R. Englehart's hardware; Borewell's fruit store; Moore's tailor shop; Scott's harness store, and F. Rodgers' general store.

### MURDER IN NEW YORK STATE.

Patrick Sablin of Tupper Lake Killed by Two Men.

Utica, N.Y., Sept. 28.—Patrick Sablin of Tupper Lake, was murdered last night by two men whose names and whereabouts are unknown. Sablin kept a lively table and was well known in the neighborhood. He was killed by two men who came to his place and asked him to take them to the Big Mill, two miles away. He hitched up and departed with them, but did not return. This morning his lifeless body was found near the mill, with two bullet holes in his head. His trunk, which had been rifled and a small change was found near the body. The horse had been unhitched from the buggy and returned to the barn in the night.

### THE ERIE SLASHES AGAIN.

Buffalo to New York, 96—Rochester to New York and Return, 84.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 28.—The Erie Railroad today threw another bomb into the local passenger business in the shape of a rate cutting. To-morrow the company is reducing a rate of \$1 for one way to New York. It was found that the cut rate of \$100 round trip to New York was well enough in its way, but with many of the traveling public it did not answer. The rate of \$1 is a reduction from \$8, the present rate of the differential lines, in order to meet this demand.

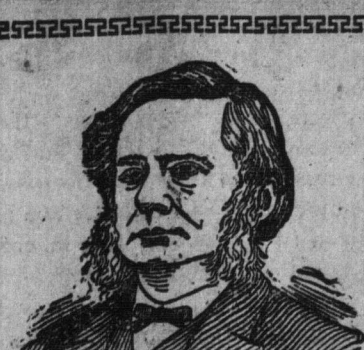

### IS THE TRANSPORT LOST?

Steamer Senator, 35 Days Out From Manila, Should Have Reached Port Days Ago.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 28.—The non-arrival of the transport Senator is beginning to cause a little uneasiness. She is now out 35 days from Manila. The steamer Senator was caught in a typhoon and had to put into Nagasaki on Aug. 30 last for repairs. The transport Colon came from Manila in 28 days. The City of Sydney and the City of London in 23 days. All these vessels stopped at Nagasaki for coal.

The Senator is now out 27 days and the Ohio 23 days. All of them will be sent back to Manila as soon as they reach here and have been re-provisioned.

### DEATH OF DR. FISHER.

One of the Oldest Practitioners in Western Canada.

Amherstburg, Ont., Sept. 28.—Dr. Fisher, aged 75 years, died at his home here this morning. He has been ailing for a few months past, caught cold last week and pneumonia set in Saturday. He was conscious to the last. He attended the late Hon. W. P. Balfour during his fatal illness in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, two years ago, was also chief physician at the asylum here nearly 50 years ago. He was a graduate of the United States, as well as Canada, and was regarded as one of the most skilled physicians in the west. He leaves, besides his widow, two sons, Dr. William of Amherstburg, Ont., and Andrew of Detroit; one daughter, Miss Little.

An appeal will be taken.
