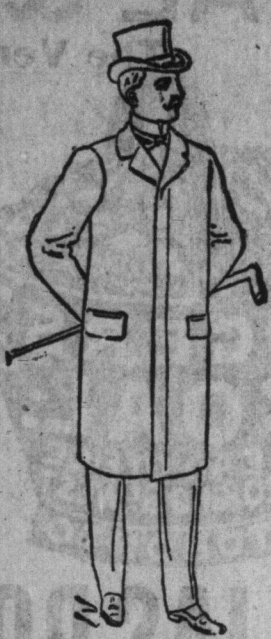

## BRITAIN IS PUSHING SPAIN

To Sell a Coaling Station in the Balearic Islands and Other Strategic Points.

DELAY BECAUSE SAGASTA WAS ILL.

It is Said That, Influenced by France and Russia, Spain Will Resist the Demands.

Madrid, Jan. 2.—The Premier, Senor Sagasta, sat up for four hours yesterday and received successively the Minister of War, the President of the Chamber and the President of Madrid. He will continue his reception to-day.

Official circles here are warmly discussing the attitude of Great Britain, owing to her pressing demands that Spain should sell a coaling station in the Balearic Islands and other strategic points, so as to re-establish Gibraltar's inviolability. The negotiations on the subject have been in abeyance since the Premier Sagasta's illness, but it is believed that Spain, influenced by France and Russia, will resist the demands of Great Britain.

THROAT CUT BY A BURGLAR.

Mrs. Oliver Miller, a Street Car Conductor's Wife, Attacked in the Night.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 2.—Oliver Miller, a street car conductor, when he returned home this morning at 2 o'clock, found his wife in her bed with her throat severely cut. The burglar vein had not been severed, however, and she told a story that had kept the police busy all day. The woman was probably recovered.

The story of Mrs. Miller is that about 11 o'clock last night a burglar entered her room through a window. After searching for a bureau, he turned and, seeing Mrs. Miller by the throat, he commanded her to get up where the money was hidden. She declared that there was not a cent in the house, at which he whipped her. She then fled, and the burglar, who did not awake during the struggle, and whom Mrs. Miller made no effort to arouse after she was wounded.

ALBANIA MUST SUFFER.

Turks to Side With Serbia—Army of 15,000 Men Hurried to the Macedonian Frontier.

Moscow, Jan. 2.—The incident was in Macedonia has assumed a serious phase. Nikolai Pastushoff, the editor of the "Moscow Gazette," who has just returned from Constantinople, says that the Sultan has sent 15,000 men post haste to the Macedonian frontier, to chastise the Albanians, whose raids into Serbia King Alexander's troops are unable to restrain.

M. Pastushoff says the Sultan has rejected the reforms in Macedonia proposed by Austria and Russia, and has decided to reform the border states according to his own method. Christians on both sides of the frontier are alarmed at the advance of Turkish troops, for Abdul Hamid has appealed to the religious prejudice of the soldiers devoted to him, and it is not believed that serious strife and much bloodshed can be avoided in putting an end to the reign of cruelty and terror now prevailing in Albania and Southern Serbia.
