

PEACELESS WHEAT MARKET

Opened Lower in Chicago on Disappointing Cables.

Very Little Selling Pressure on the Market—Cable Rather Erratic—Good Cash Demand for Oats—Provisions Dull, but Steady—Latest Commercial News.

Wednesday Evening, Nov. 15. Wheat opened 96c to 96 1/2c in Chicago today on lower Liverpool cables, which came as a surprise. The market took an upward turn toward the close, December closing at 97 1/2c and May at 71 1/2c.

Liverpool wheat futures were weak today, closing 3d to 3d 1/2 lower than yesterday. Corn closed 3/4 to 3/4 1/2 lower than yesterday.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth today were 681 cars, against 778 a week ago and 1089 a year ago. Our receipts at Chicago were: Wheat 33, corn 213, oats 103.

Stocks of wheat in store at Port William on Nov. 13, 1,405,000 bushels, as against 1,357,240 bushels on Nov. 6 and 941,289 bushels a year ago.

Exports at New York today: Flour, 1002 barrels and 11,961 sacks; wheat, 47,590 bushels.

The corn crop of the world is estimated at 2,474,000,000 bushels, against 2,419,000,000 bushels in 1898 and 2,249,000,000 bushels in 1897. The crop outside of the United States was 414,000,000 bushels this year, 495,000,000 bushels in 1898, and 347,000,000 bushels in 1897.

The aggregate grain crops of the world, as estimated by the Liverpool Corn Trade News, are as follows: 1899, 9,864,000,000 bushels; 1898, 10,000,000,000 bushels; 1897, 9,220,000,000 bushels; 1896, 9,220,000,000 bushels.

GRAIN AND PRODUCE.

Flour—Ontario patents, in bags, \$3.25 to \$3.50; straight rollers, \$3.25 to \$3.45; Hungarian patents, \$3.45; Manitoba bakers, \$3.70, all on track at Toronto.

Oats—White oats quoted at 25 1/2c to 26c west.

Rye—Quoted at 51c to 52c north and west.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce were light—2100 bushels of grain, 30 loads of hay, of straw, 150 dressed hogs, and some small lots of poultry.

Wheat steady, 70 bushels selling at 90c; white, 71c; red at 70c, with 900 bushels of good at 68c.

Barley steady; 800 bushels sold at 42 1/2c to 44c.

Oats unchanged at 23c to 24c for 600 bushels.

Buckwheat—One load sold at 50c per ton for hay steady at \$11 to \$12 per ton for 30 loads.

Straw steady; six loads selling at \$8 to \$9 per ton.

Dressed Hogs—Prices steady, 100 selling at from \$5.25 to \$5.40 per cwt.

Prices for poultry, ducks and eggs remain unchanged, but inclined to be easier, owing to mild weather.

Eggs—Strictly new-laid are firm at 25c to 26c per dozen.

Butter—Choice dairy butter is none so plentiful and sells at 16c to 17c, firmer, owing to scarcity of cars, selling at 45c per lb. for our lots, and as much as 50c per lb. for farmers' wagons.

Hides—Prices have advanced, and the quoted buyers are higher than they have been in years.

Dead Meats—The market for these is dull, especially for beef, mutton and lamb, with prices easier.

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BULLS ARE THE AGGRESSIVE.

Money Rate Higher in Toronto—Continued Activity in War Eagle at Higher Prices—Latest Financial News.
