LOOT FROM TIEN TSIN.

Which Was Brought to San Francisco on the Solace-Governor.

LABOR MEN AND POLITICS

Vice-President Flett of the Labor Congress Would Have Them Stand Clear of the Parties.

DELEGATES DIFFER IN OPINION.

Delegate O'Donoghue as Critic—Committee Got a Promise From Mr. Mulock.

Ottawa, Sept. 20.—Vice-President Flett made a vigorous speech at the Labor Congress this morning, denouncing party politics in labor.

The report of the committee on the president's address and the Executive Committee's report contained the following clause, with reference to the vote taken on independent political action:

"The committee does not feel justified in making any recommendation, in view of the fact that the vote polled does not indicate to a sufficient extent the actual position of the organized bodies of the Dominion."

Delegate Morin of Winnipeg moved the following amendment:

"That in the opinion of this committee the result of the referendum vote on independent political action of sufficient importance to justify the Congress in taking such steps as may be deemed expedient to further the progress of such an action."

A Retrograde Step.

Delegate Flett regarded the action of the committee as retrograde. He and those who thought with him were tired of praying for help at the door of party politics. In view of the reports that the Congress would have a right to take such action as it saw fit, he thought it was a retrograde step to bear the action of Congress, and part of the committee gave voice to such a feeling. While the Government had been throwing stones to the Congress, it was throwing stones to the Congress.

An Instance in Point.

He reviewed the Crow's Nest Pass Commission as an illustration of the way labor was treated. The commission found blame was laid at the door of the corporation, and the Government had never done anything to help the situation. He strongly urged the adoption of the amendment.

Delegate Dan as Critic.

He gave a comprehensive and scathing critique of the preceding speakers. He said that the delegates sitting next him that day were a Government employee.

Mr. O'Donoghue said anybody who wanted his place, could have it, and he went on to quote other delegates against themselves. He was very much charged with indignation and called to order.

After a long and heated discussion, some of which was quite lively, the vote was taken on the amendment to the committee's report. It was carried by 88 yeas to 22 nays, and the Congress adjourned until 10 o'clock.

DISASTER IN BOHEMIA.

Dux, Bohemia, Sept. 20.—An explosion occurred at the Frisch-Gluck mine, situated about 15 miles from Prague, on Tuesday. Thirty-five persons were killed, and 15 injured. Five persons are missing.

England. No such document had been sent to him or anyone whom he could control. It contained views utterly opposed to his own. [Applause.] He commended his action in this regard to the editor of The Echo as a proof that Sir Charles wished not to be two-faced. [Applause.]

He referred to his statement that Sir Wilfrid was not English for him.
