Hamilton Will Make a Quarterly Audit of Street Railway and Gas Companies.

SWEEPING CHANGES EFFECTED

The Finance Committee Cautious in Expenditure of Civic Funds—Victorial Memorial Grant.

Hamilton, Jan. 22.—Much business came up before the Finance Committee to-night, but on most of the positions, action was taken. The most important matter brought up was that dealing with the work of the city auditor. It was decided to extend the duties so that they will take in the Parks Committee, Cemetery, Laboratory Board, City Hospital, Board of Works and House of Refuge. The auditor will also make a quarterly audit of the Street Railway Company and the Hamilton Gas Company, when ordered to do so by the Mayor. The bylaw appointing an auditor was left over till the next meeting of the City Council. A resolution was also passed that the matter of appointing a permanent auditor be not proceeded with.
