London's Fine Credit.

The Splendid Rate of Three and Three-Quarters Per Cent Offered

For \$100,000 Worth of Debentures—The Cap Shops Bonus and L. and P. & S. Work—The South Street Sewer.

The finance committee held a most important meeting last night. The chief business was the consideration of tenders for \$100,000 worth of debentures—\$100,000 being G. E. R. bonds debentures bearing interest at 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and running 30 years from 1894; and the \$85,000 being for L. and P. S. R. bridges and terminals, the debentures being 3 1/4 per cent, interest payable semi-annually, and running a period of 40 years from Dec. 9, 1895. Five tenders were received. The highest bid was for 3 1/4 per cent on the two issues combined. This is a highly satisfactory rate, proving that the credit of London stands unimpaired. The last issue of city debentures was sold for the same figure, with the exception that date was the best ever secured.

THE SOUTH STREET SEWER.

This question was brought up again by further applications for remission of sewer rates, the council having granted the rebate to a number of ratepayers who claimed that the sewer had been of no use to them. Ald. Armstrong said he thought of moving for a reconsideration of the council's decision, as he had received subsequent information which had changed his opinion. He had a report from the engineer showing the fall from the cellar floor of each house to the top of the sewer. The figures are: Mr. Farquhar, 2 9/10 feet; Mr. Morris, 2 17/100 feet; Mr. Allan, 2 40/100 feet; Mr. Davis, 2 50/100 feet; Mr. Reid, 1 foot; Mrs. Ryan, west house, 1 35/100 feet; Mrs. Ryan, east house, 3 feet; Mr. Jackson, 5 80/100 feet; Mrs. Bruce, 16 20/100 feet. Thomas-Bannaman's petition for remission of sewer rates on this street was filed. Mrs. A. Bruce's petition met the same fate, being considered absurd, as the engineer reported that there was a 16-foot fall between her cellar and the sewer.

OTHER MATTERS.

The committee decided not to use city schools for municipal election purposes as recommended by the city clerk. Ald. Bennett said there would be no saving, as the teachers would only have the assessment which the city would continue to pay them their salaries. The petition for the opening of Lorne avenue east was laid over, and Mr. Hayman's request for remission of street watering taxes was filed. Mr. S. J. Southcott's petition for a rebate of sewer taxes on account of over-assessment will be dealt with when the assessment committee has made the usual inquiries. Ald. Armstrong (chairman), Mayor Little, and Ald. Carver, Taylor, Bennett and Geary, and City Treasurer Pope were present. The Protestant Orphans' Home Boys' Brigade asked for a \$2 grant. Declined.

PIMPLE AND THISTLE.

Two Peculiar but Fatal Cases of Blood-Poisoning.

Southampton, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Harris, of Kinslow township, ran a thistle into her finger and nail, and with a needle. As a result blood poisoning set in, causing her death. Port Hope, Nov. 21.—A week ago Miss Lizzie Burley, of Newtonville, picked a pimple on her lip with a needle. Blood-poisoning resulted, and a doctor was called, but he could do nothing. She died in agony Wednesday.

Want Free Raw Material.

Reduction in Taxation Asked for in That Shape.

A Londoner before the Dominion Tariff Commission.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—A deputation of boot and shoe men waited on the Dominion tariff commissioners yesterday. It was considered that a great discrepancy existed between the duties they pay on their raw material, about 20 per cent, and those accorded them as "protection," amounting to 25 per cent, so that the real "protection" was only 5 per cent. The deputation were satisfied that the duties could be readjusted so as to make a difference of at least 15 per cent, without decreasing the revenue. The dealers pay 1 1/2 per cent duty on the leathers and consider 15 per cent sufficient. The raw material of the tanner was admitted free, and they wished equal care. The article suggested would be kids, linings, inks, dressings, blackings and machinery.

BAR AND PIG IRON.

Messrs. George Bertram and Edward Gurney represented that owing to the present duties on pig iron and bar iron being so much higher than those on steel, and the article suggested would be made, and that some other way should be found of bringing about the development of the iron deposits of the Dominion other than by taxing the users of iron to such an extent as has been done for years past. The users of iron do not take this position in any spirit of antagonism to the producers of pig and bar iron, but they think the tax should be considered from the standpoint of the general interests of the country; that it appears as present as if there were no other way of bringing about the development of our iron deposits to that of the tax on the finished product, which runs from 40 to 48 per cent, while the duty on the finished product averages 27 1/2 per cent.

CARPETS.

The carpet manufacturers pointed out that duty on foreign carpets of various grades of quality, ranging from 58 1/2 to 82 1/2 per cent, is an average of 70 per cent, while the average duty of the finished article is but 36 per cent. They requested that any readjustment should not be to their injury.

R. Burroughs, of Guelph, manufacturer of chenille curtains and table covers, on which there is a duty of 30 per cent, has to pay a duty of 25 per cent on cotton as raw material. He asked that the tax on the finished product be increased.

Three clothing manufacturers represented that if the tax were reduced, cheaper clothing from England and Germany would come in.

FAVORS RECIPROCITY.

A. J. H. Eckhardt, casket manufacturer, who has been paid on his raw materials. He asked that the specific taxes be taken off. He was ready for reciprocity with the United States.

WANTS FREE RAW MATERIAL.

J. C. McLaughlin, representing the Toronto Electric Motor Company, asked that magnetic wire used in motors, practically the raw material of the industry, and now paying a duty of 30 per cent, be placed on the free list.

A LONDONER IN IT.

Prof. Bowman, of London, and two Toronto paint manufacturers, appeared in opposition to a deputation which came before the commission a day or two ago, and which asked on behalf of vinegar manufacturers that acetic acid should be made liable to a revenue duty. They pointed out that acetic acid is used largely in some manufactures, and the imposition of the proposed duty would seriously close up several manufacturers in which extensive plants are engaged.

This closed the hearing at Toronto. The commission will resume its sittings in Hamilton on Nov. 24.

OIL AT FLORENCE.

Local Business Men Will Test the New Territory—Some New York Prospects.

Florence, Nov. 21.—Two oil prospectors from New York registered at the McRoberts House on Wednesday. It is understood that they have leased several farms in the near vicinity, and intend putting down a number of test wells on each. As oil has been located in several of the surrounding villages it seems probable that oil may be found here in large quantities.

A syndicate, in which a number of local business men are interested, has been formed to sink wells on the Fenby farm. A number of the farmers in the vicinity are already pumping from two to ten barrels a day, so the prospects are of the brightest for the new company. Alex. Dobbin intends putting down 15 wells on his farm, and will put in a pumping rig, and give it a thorough testing.

MANY MEETINGS IN ONTARIO.

Notification has been received by the Ontario Department of Agriculture of the following winter exhibitions: The Ontario Poultry Association's annual show at Guelph, to be held from Jan. 11 to 16 next, and to be addressed by the Minister or Deputy Minister of Agriculture. The Dominion Cattle, Sheep and Swine Breeders' Association will meet at Guelph Dec. 7 to 10. Hon. John Dryden being expected to preside. The cattle breeders will meet on the 7th, the sheep breeders on the 8th, and the swine breeders on the 10th.

The Ontario Fruit Growers' Association will meet in Kingston, beginning Dec. 2.

The Ontario Beekeepers' Association will meet in Toronto on Dec. 8, 9 and 10 next.

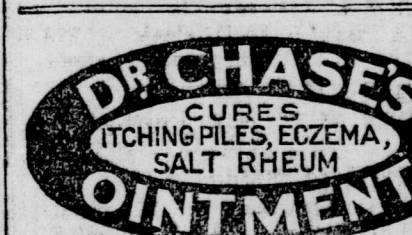
