

WEST OF COBALT ARE RICH VEINS

Miner Makes a Good Find 4
Miles From the Town.

SINK SHAFTS ON NIPISSING

Trespassers and Curious People Liable
To Be Ejected From Mine Prop-
erty—Bane of Litigation.

Cobalt, Nov. 10.—While nearly all the mining prospects within a radius of five miles of the town site have been picked over and registered by some body, comparatively little development has taken place elsewhere. With the exception of the big mines, situated practically on the west shore of Lake Cobalt, the mining and shipping has been confined to properties east of the little black lake—which is supposed to be the center of the silver-bearing district.

But things are now beginning to loom large in the neighborhood of Portage Bay, about four miles west of the town. On Tuesday an industrious miner, Alexander Neilson, by name and known by that name, discovered a vein which showed a certain amount of native silver. His claim being staked on the shore of Portage Bay and a tiny pond dignified with the name Iron Lake. Neilson has hunted the shiny metal and laboriously followed the elusive vein in more than one camp. He knows a bonanza vein when he sees it. When he showed a block of the silver-streaked calcite to a representative of certain Cleveland capitalists in town on Tuesday night, he was offered \$35,000 spot cash for his claim. Neilson declined with thanks. The veteran miner went out to Portage Bay Friday with more tools and men to help to make further investigations.

Several others with claims passed and registered in that district are holding out for good prices. It is understood that the Colonial Syndicate, which has already acquired control of the Hanson and other properties, are making an earnest attempt to buy the best of the Portage Bay claims. In the meantime the present owners are not resting on their achievements. With one, two or half a dozen men they are busy getting out the ore. Small quantities of silver are already being bagged ready for shipment. It is said to be good for at least \$3,000 a ton. Gold has also been found in this section in small quantities. The roads to the bay are in a terrible condition just now, and the owners there are experiencing great difficulty in getting their supplies.

The draining of Peterson Lake, east of Cobalt, is to be followed by the undermining of Cedar Lake, to the northwest. Most of the lake is included in the mining rights secured by the Cleveland-Cobalt Company. They have about 114 acres of silver-bearing land, and have tested about thirty veins, most of which have been found promising. It is proposed to sink a shaft on the south shore of the lake, and drift under the bed, where diamond drilling has indicated that silver exists in a sixteen-foot vein. It is regarded as a rather dangerous experiment, as the actual depth of the water in spots has not been ascertained.

The level of Peterson Lake has already been lowered five or six feet, and it is expected that before winter sets in one arm of the body of water will be drained off the map of Coleman township. The company interested have dammed up a narrow isthmus that connects their concession with the larger portion, owned by the Nipissing people. The work of draining the lake has been fraught with many engineering difficulties, and has doubtless cost much more than the promoters anticipated. The drainage canal has been constructed through about a quarter of a mile of soft rock, and a hundred yards of "soft spot," which gave them considerable trouble. All the forces of the company have been engaged in the draining work since spring. Recently shafting operations on the shores of the lake have been attempted.

New veins or extensions of old ones with extraordinary runs of the precious metals, are being discovered, and blocked out every week in the older working and shipping mines of the district. A corps of carpenters and builders are working from daylight to dark on the Nipissing reservation, building shelters for men and machinery, so that work can be continued all winter. Nearly all the operations at the "Nip" have in the past been of the open-cut variety. Several shafts are now being sunk, however.

Nearly all the older mines have large quantities of metal bagged and ready for shipment. Local storekeepers report being busier than ever before. A quartet of adventurous young prospectors, having taken all the excitement they desire from Cobalt, purchased supplies yesterday for a prospective trip to the Ender Lake district, where gold has been found in paying quantities. They will spend the winter on the ground, locate their claims, and get ready for heavy work in the spring of 1907.

The development of some of the best claims in the Cobalt region is hamp-

ered by litigation. In the same section as the Foster, on continuation, perhaps, of the same bonanza veins, is the Lawson property. For months operations here have been stopped, while the lawyers dissipate the prospective rich products of the claim in law courts. The silver veins show on the surface probably more definitely on the Lawson claim than on any of the others in the camp. The guide rolls over a log on top of the rock, and there exposed to view, are the ridges of rich silver; the apex, perhaps, of one of the richest treasure troves in Coleman township. Other rich properties are held up by litigation. In fact, the richer they are, the more prone are the owners to get involved in the net of the law. As a consequence there is considerable hesitation among capitalists. Deals that might be consummated, on the spot are delayed because of a fear that there might be a claim against the properties in the law courts.

Several of the mine superintendents have taken measures to prevent the indiscriminate inspection of their properties by the public. The grade silver is good for 75 cents an ounce, and it doesn't take many nuggets of high grade calcite ore to make up five dollars' worth of loot. Even the dumps, which assay in low grade ore from \$200 to \$500 per ton, are now jealously guarded. On the principal mine properties of the region the "no trespassing" signs, are rigidly enforced. Persons who violate the regulations are marched off to the superintendent or the mine manager's office, there to give an explanation of their presence. The chap who has ventured unbidden into the mine property, "just to have a look around," is liable to be ejected with scant courtesy, or turned over to the custody of Constable Caldwell, at Cobalt town.

VOLCANO GROWLS; DISCHARGES ASHES

Renewed Activity of Mt. Vesuvius
Causes Panic in Nearby
Villages.

Naples, Nov. 11.—At noon yesterday Mount Vesuvius and the surrounding villages were shaken up by a kind of earthquake, which was accompanied by detonations and followed by a considerable fall of ashes, especially over Ottajano, which was destroyed during the eruption of last April, and now is in course of reconstruction.

The phenomenon caused great alarm. Investigation showed that part of the crater of the volcano had fallen in. During the afternoon there were three more slight shocks in the Vesuvius region, and a further discharge of ashes, which was blown in the direction of Pompeii and Ottajano.

Thus far Naples has not been affected by the eruption, but a dark column of smoke can be seen from the city hovering over the crater. Prof. Matteucci, director of the Royal Observatory on Mount Vesuvius, in an interview with the Associated Press said: "I do not believe this is a new eruption, as all the phenomena attending such an event are lacking. I think the rain of ashes was caused by the slipping down of the superior lip of the crater and that the earth tremblings were due to water from the recent heavy rains having reached the first cone inside the volcano, producing an internal explosion."

SPAIN AND THE VATICAN

Report of Clash Greatly Exaggerated
According to the Holy See.

Rome, Nov. 11.—The situation between the Vatican and Germany over the Polish question is becoming daily more critical and is even threatening to endanger the existing good relations between Berlin and the Holy See. Germany insists that the Vatican must help it in repressing what it considers to be rebellion in Poland, while the Poles are counting upon the assistance of the Pope.

The Vatican denies the reports which predict a rupture between Spain and the Holy See. Vatican authorities declare that the differences between them and Spain have been very much exaggerated by the Spanish Liberal press, backed up by French newspapers, and that the negotiations between Rome and Madrid are proceeding in a most friendly manner.

It is pointed out that all the members of the present Spanish cabinet are good Catholics.

TORONTO WANTS THREE MILLIONS.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—Three bylaws will be brought before the city council on Monday and be submitted to the people on Jan. 1, said Mayor Coatsworth yesterday.

The amount asked will be \$3,225,000. The bylaws to which the mayor referred are as follows: Truck sewer, \$3,000,000; Yonge street bridge, \$100,000; two bridges for new street car line to the exhibition grounds at Bathurst street and Strachan avenue, \$125,000.

WILL THE LORDS CRUMBLE AWAY?

Interference With Commons
May End Upper House.

BITTER STRUGGLE IS AT HAND

Peers Slashing Education Bill and Will
Undoubtedly Reject a Home
Rule Measure.

London, Nov. 11.—British politics of late years has been very humdrum in its character, but there is at the present time a quarrel brewing between the House of Peers and Commons which promises to be very lively and very fierce.

The House of Lords are just now mauling the education bill in such a way that the ministers are being left with but two alternatives. They must either drop the bill or resign.

They do not want to adopt the latter expedient, because they might return from the constituency with a much reduced majority and it is very well known that they want to introduce a home rule bill for Ireland at the next session.

Now it goes without saying that the peers will reject any measure proposing to give home rule to Ireland, and then will begin a fierce agitation against the upper chamber, not for mending it, but ending it.

There are henchmen of the Prime Minister, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, who state in private that it is distinctly understood as an essential part of the Radical programme that the rejection of the home rule bill, following the "tinkering" with the education bill by the peers will be followed neither by dissolution nor resignation, but by a superannuation of the House of Lords.

A strong step of this kind would involve grave constitutional changes, but the House of Lords will not crumble up like matchwood, as some Radicals, pre-empting on their great majority in the House of Commons, are fond of boasting.

The fact is that the social roots of the hereditary orders in England are very strong, and the British people are prone to respect the social and local influence of ancestral wealth and public utility.

The House of Lords believes that on the education and home rule questions it is not likely to arouse the anger of the nation.

Still the fact remains that the Prime Minister is deeply pledged to introduce a home rule bill, and everybody is wondering how it can be settled while the House of Lords remains as it is.

There are many men on both sides of the House of Lords who favor what is known as "the enabling" act, which would empower peers to sit in Committee with the Associated Press said: "I do not believe this is a new eruption, as all the phenomena attending such an event are lacking. When the crisis arises the House of Lords will be told that they are utterly out of touch with popular feeling and that they never intervene in the work of legislation except to mar the handiwork of the Commons.

It will be declared that their principles of action are oligarchical and aristocratic, while those of the Lower House are popular and democratic.

The bulk of the members of the Upper House would say, "So goes a theory which many observers are much inclined to doubt."

There are members of the House of Peers who are prepared to meet the Radicals when they talk about "trusting the people," and one of the proposals which it is understood will come establishing the referendum as one of the British institutions shall be in force. This, it is contended, will take away from the Radicals all excuse for denouncing the peers for their lack of democracy.

This referendum bill would lay down that if and when the two houses could not agree as to the propriety of any bill, either house, might, in passing the bill in the form desired by the other house, insert without further debate or conference, a proviso that before being submitted for royal assent the bill should be referred to the electors of the United Kingdom, a poll of the people being taken in the manner prescribed by the act.

In view of the coming crisis such a bill has actually been roughly drafted and supporters of it believe that such action on the part of the House of Lords would leave no doubt in men's minds as to the accuracy of the popular sovereignty by the House of Lords.

Whatever happens, one thing is absolutely certain, that the beginning of a fierce struggle between the two houses is not far off.

THE TURF

TRACK RECORD BROKEN.

New York, Nov. 10.—More than 20,000 persons enjoyed the racing at Aqueduct this afternoon. It was a profitable day for the talent, as four favorites and two second choices were victorious, all well supported. The Edgemore, for all ages, a weight-for-age affair, at a mile and a furlong, proved the most interesting event from a racing viewpoint. The New Castle stable's Running Water was a heavily backed favorite at 6 to 5, with James R. Keene's Philander going back to 3 to 2, and J. L. McGinnis' Frank Gill remaining steady at 4. Frank Gill cut out a swift pace, but in the long run home Running Water hooked up with him and in a ding-dong finish the latter won by a couple of inches in 1:52, a new track record, with Philander at 2 to 1, and J. L. McGinnis' Frank Gill at 4 to 1.

Notter, who rode the latter, claimed a 120 pounds and, making the pace, won easily by three lengths in :59. Expansionist won the Queensboro Steeplechase.

HILLMAN MAKES 300 YARDS 36 2-5 SECONDS

New York, Nov. 11.—The national indoor track and field championships of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States in the Madison Square Garden were finished last night.

One of the features was the defeat of Melvin W. Sheppard, the American crack half-mile runner, by E. B. Parsons, of Yale, who is the intercollegiate champion half-mile runner. These two met in a field of half a dozen, including Paul Pilgrim, the Olympic champion.

Parsons had the advantage from the start, and practically ran Sheppard off his feet. Sheppard quit in the last 60 yards and failed to finish in the first four.

Harry L. Hillman, of the New York A. C., who was injured on the trip of the American athletes to Athens last April, surprised the crowd by making a new world's record in the 300 yards hurdle event. Summaries:

HARVARD WAS TOO STRONG FOR REDS

Defeated Carlisle 5 to 0—The
Michigan Captain Crippled
—Yale's Hard Game.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 10.—Harvard defeated the agile Carlisle Indians today in a lively game of football. The score was 5 to 0. The touchdown came through a fine 47-yards run by Wendell in the first five minutes of the game. Harvard back went through the Carlisle line and a delayed pass, and from his own 45-yard line planted the ball on Carlisle's 15-yard line. From that point six Harvard rushes carried the ball across the line, Wendell scoring. Durr failed to kick an easy goal.

SEVERE LOSS FOR MICHIGAN.
Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 10.—Ann Arbor is all gloom tonight. All supporters of the Michigan football team will be in a despondent mood tomorrow, when they learn of the loss of the game which Michigan received today in a practice football game, which is regarded as meaning a defeat at the hands of Pennsylvania next Saturday.

Capt. Joe Curtis took a chance with his rather weak ankle, and got into the game with the scrub-ineligible combination, during what was to be the last three minutes of play. He suffered a bad break of his bone in the left leg. Curtis jumped into the game to try and inspire the "varsity" into more active work. They had been playing rather listlessly, and the scrub-ineligibles had not only held them to a 0 to 0 score, but were holding the "varsity" to no gains. With three minutes to play, Curtis went to his position at left end. We were given the ball to carry and went through for seven yards. He took it again and repeated. Then Steekle failed to gain, and Curtis dropped back to work out one of the Johnny Carrels' fake kicks. He was stopped at the line of scrimmage.

FOUGHT TO A STANDSTILL.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 10.—The University of Pennsylvania and Lafayette football teams fought each other to a standstill today, neither side being able to cross the other's goal line. Pennsylvania, however, came nearest to scoring, and on one occasion had the ball on Lafayette's one-yard line, where the Eastonians made a great stand and threw the Pennsylvania attack back. This was the only time when the Pennsylvania attack really got going, and it took but ten plays to carry the ball 64 yards. On two other occasions Lafayette held for downs, but the Pennsylvania attack broke through the line and scored. The game ended in a tie, 0 to 0.

STAMINA COUNTED WITH YALE.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 10.—Speed, staying and rallying power won today at Yale Field a victory for the Yale eleven over the Brown team, 5 to 0. Yale was unable to cross the Brown line until the second half, and Knox missed an easy goal. The visitors played all around the Yale team for almost the whole of the first half, sensational work marking the opening moments of the game.

GOPHERS BEAT CHICAGO.

Chicago, Nov. 10.—Minnesota defeated Chicago at Marshall Field this afternoon by the light margin of a field goal to a touchdown. The final score was: Minnesota 7, Chicago 2. Minnesota's line was like a stone wall, and prevented the Maroons from accomplishing anything by straight football.

PRINCETON BLANKS CADETS.

West Point, Nov. 10.—Princeton defeated the West Point Cadets on the football field here today by 8 to 0. The visitors scored twice in the first half through the splendid kicking of Harlan. His scoring of a goal from a drop kick was the feature of the game.

QUEEN'S WALLOPED OTTAWA COLLEGE

The Capital Seniors Could Not
Stand Pace Set for Them
—Queen's Juniors, Too.

Kingston, Nov. 10.—Queen's senior overwhelmed the Ottawa College aggregation here today, defeating them by the one-sided score of 31 to 0. The locals were in fine fettle, and from the start set a pace which the Capital City could not stand. The most sensational feature of the game was the kicking of Ken Williams, Queen's center half. During the game he placed the ball between his opponents' goal posts five times, including four drop-kicks, and one convert of a try. Besides this, he repeatedly punted the ball over the visitors' line, resulting in rouges and safety touches. The half-time score was 8 to 0, including one drop-kick by Williams.

Despite the big score the game was a sensational one to watch, and many brilliant plays were pulled off. Baker scored a nice try for Queen's in the closing minutes of the game. Only on one occasion did the ball cross Queen's line, and then Crawford saved what looked like a sure score by a beautiful run. Queen's were superior to their opponents on the wing line and scrimmage, thus protecting their half-backs. MacDonald, Fegg and Turner also starred for Queen's, and conspicuous on the Ottawa line were Phillastreau, Durocher and MacDonald, the latter being forced to retire from quarter with a bad shoulder.

Pennock and Quarter Back MacKenzie starred for the locals, while McCarthy played well on the visitors' line.
