It had not accorded the city courteous treatment by breaking the existing agreement without first consulting the city. It was "darned impertinence," The council has been snubbed, and Mayor Somerville ridiculed by sneering references to him in the company's bulletin.

Ald. Ashplant contended that the company had no right to collect a five-cent fare from people boarding cars at the corner of Dundas and Richmond street. If it did he favored making it keep its "blooming Springbank cars" off the city streets, and let it run them from the second cove to Springbank cars on the city streets, the probleme were entitled to a transfer from people were entitled to a transfer from second cove to Springbank. He pointed out that so long as the company ran its Springbank cars on the city streets, the people were entitled to a transfer from any city line to the Springbank line, and this would carry them as far as the second cove. He suggested that the council should advertise this fact that the people might know it. He also pointed out that the new charge of the company was inequitable. The cost on some residents of the city, to go to Springbank, was only ten cents, and the charge on others was ten cents and two tickets. This was unfair.
