WINDSOR M.C.R. YARDS TIED UP BY SWITCHMEN'S STRIKE

NOT A FREIGHT CAR LEAVING M.C.R. YARDS IN WINDSOR AS RESULT OF SWITCHMEN'S STRIKE

One Hundred Yardmen Were Laid Off On Sunday — An Immense Quantity of Merchandise Stored in Hundreds of Cars Standing On Side Tracks—More Are Coming From East.

Windsor, April 12.—The local Michigan Central freight yards are completely tied up, not a freight car is moving out, and two lonely yard engines, attempting vainly to cope with the situation, are sitting idly in a maze of rolling stock shunting the incoming cars from the east on to side switches.

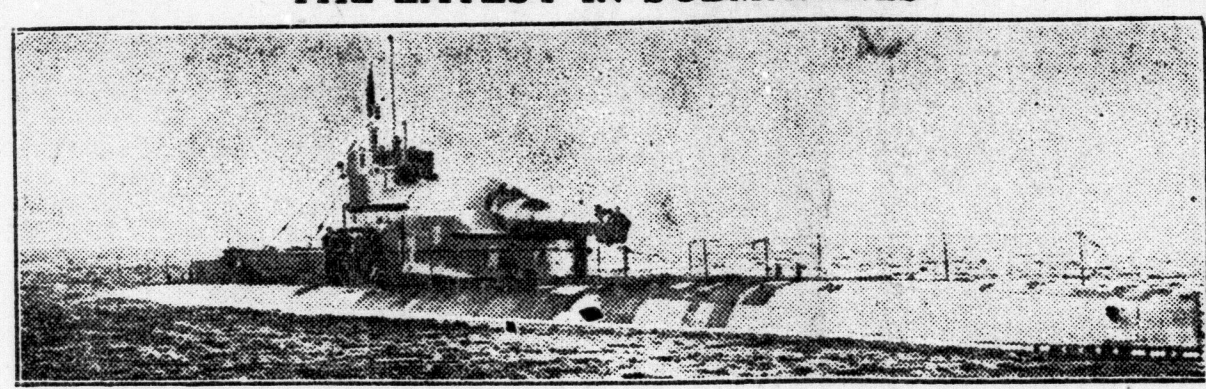
RUSSIAN DELEGATION SIGNS CONTRACT FOR 500 U. S. LOCOMOTIVES

Trade Unions' Officials Issue Order of General Strike.

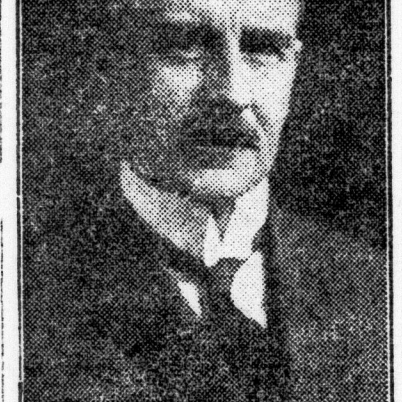
TO START TUESDAY

Action Urged As a Protest Against Political Prisoners.

Dublin, April 12.—The officials of the Irish Trades Union Congress and the Labor party today issued a call to the workers of Ireland for a general strike throughout the country tomorrow as a protest against the treatment of political prisoners.

The officials, in their call, demand the release of those imprisoned for political offences.

The general strike call does not affect those employed on newspapers, the telegraph services, the bakers, the humanitarian services and necessary workers among the horses and cattle.

VON LUETZTOW IS SAID TO BE MAKING READY FOR REVOLT

German Military Leader Preparing New Rebellion.

Berlin, April 12.—Major-Gen. Baron von Luetzow, who played a leading part in the recent Berlin revolt, is reported to be preparing for a fresh revolutionary movement, which would mean war or peace.

POLES CLAIM REDS DO ALL ATTACKING

Definite Decision To Be Sought At Conference.

Warsaw, April 12.—(Associated Press.)—The Poles continue their preparations to send delegates to Bersey for a peace conference with the Bolsheviks on April 17. In an interview today Foreign Minister Patek said he expected a clear and decisive answer from the Bolshevik Government, which would mean war or peace.

GIRL ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.
St. Catharines, April 12.—While playing near her home, Margaret, 9-year-old daughter of Peter Adair, tripped as she ran on the boulevard, striking her temple against a post. She died instantly.

SINN FEINERS ON HUNGER STRIKE; IN SERIOUS STATE

Paris, April 12.—George Gavan Duffy, Sinn Fein member of parliament, and envoy of the Irish republic to the peace conference, is bringing to the official attention of that body the treatment of the political prisoners in Dublin. His statement was actuated by the following telegram which he received yesterday from Dublin: "Over 100 republican prisoners incarcerated in Mountjoy Prison, in Dublin, as common criminals, many being detained on suspicion without charge, have been on a hunger strike since Sunday, April 4. They demand the observance of the agreement obtained by Bishop McMorris and the Lord Mayor of Dublin, whereby the English Government undertook to recognize the special status of political prisoners. Several men are in grave danger, and crowds are reciting prayers for the dying at the gates of the jail."

The telegram was signed by Kathleen Clark, of the board of aid-men, and Miss O'Rahilly, for the republican prisoners' committee.

FRANCE REPEATS PROMISE TO WITHDRAW TROOPS IMMEDIATELY IF GERMANS WILL LEAVE RUHR

Assurance Is Given in Latest French Note That No Further Independent Action Will Be Taken If Germans Will Evacuate Area in Ruhr Valley.

London, April 12.—The latest French note on the subject of the French occupation move, received here this morning, says that the French troops in Frankfurt and other occupied cities will be withdrawn immediately upon the withdrawal of the German troops from the Ruhr region. It promises, it is stated, that no further independent action will be taken by France.

ALL CAUCASUS REGION, INCLUDING ARMENIA, MAY TURN BOLSHEVIK

Georgians Threaten To Join With Russian Reds — Soviets Have Opened Road To Black Sea Port of Poti.

Constantinople, April 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—Disquieting reports have been received from Batoum, where Georgians, who have been opposing allied occupation, threaten to join with the Bolsheviks and take over the whole region.

Danger that all of the Caucasus and Trans-Caucasian, including Armenia, may turn Bolshevik, is causing more uneasiness here than the Syrian and Anatolian situations. The capture of Poti, the next Black Sea port to the southward, and Batoum, and the Azerbaijan Tartars are fighting the Armenians on both the eastern and western frontiers, according to dispatches received here.

TRAIN THROWN FROM ELEVATED TRACKS TO STREET 25 FT. BELOW

Passengers Have Remarkable Escape From Death.

ONE WOMAN HURT

Motorman Is Reported As Missing After Accident.

New York, April 12.—Passengers on an elevated train had remarkable escapes from death today when they were catapulted to the street, a distance of 25 feet, in the midst of the debris of the car in which they were bound to work.

London, April 12.—By Canadian Associated Press.—No official confirmation has yet been received here of the appointment of Mr. Greelman as agent general of Ontario, as reported in a Times' Toronto cable, which states the appointment will coincide with an active campaign to induce farmers' laborers from Great Britain and the continent to emigrate.

NORTH BAY MAN MURDERED.
North Bay, April 12.—Wm. W. G. Porter of the Pacific Hotel, generally known as Billie, was found last night about 10:30 o'clock on High street, near the Wallace Park, in a dying condition. He breathed his last a few moments after being found. He had evidently been clubbed to death by some person unknown.

BRITISH REPLY IS HANDED TO MILLERAND BY LORD DERBY

French Premier Refuses To Discuss Contents With Correspondents.

Paris, April 12.—The Earl of Derby, British ambassador to France, delivered to Premier Millerand at 1 o'clock this afternoon the British reply to the French premier's note of last evening. M. Millerand refused to discuss the contents of the note with the newspaper correspondents.

Immediately after receipt of the note M. Millerand left to call upon President Deschanel.

M. Millerand held a few minutes' conversation with the various chiefs of the foreign office before leaving for the palace, and it is probable that the contents of the note were immediately made the subject of discussion by the foreign affairs personnel.

It was stated, however, that no information would be given out for publication before the premier's return from his visit to the president.

Premier Millerand's reply, which probably will go forward this evening, will be the sixth note transmitted by the Government in three days.

SEVEN KILLED, 200 HURT IN EXPLOSION AT MUNITIONS DUMP

Disaster Occurs Near Koenigsberg, East Prussia.

London, April 12.—Two hundred persons who were injured in the explosion of a munitions dump at Rostenstein, near Koenigsberg, East Prussia, yesterday, have been rescued, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Daily Mail. Explosions are continuing, and rescuers are able to approach the scene only in armored cars.

Fuses were being removed from big shells at the time when one was ignited in some way and thirty tremendous explosions followed, wrecking dwellings over a wide area and shattering thousands of windows in the city.

LIBERALS AND LABOR OPPOSING GREENWOOD

Debate On Divorce Promises To Be Interesting.

London, April 12.—(By the Canadian Associated Press.)—Parliament resumed today after a short Easter recess with an unexciting program for the week, although the debate on Sunday in the House of Commons on the divorce bill may produce something interesting.

The most arresting domestic political feature of the moment is the result of the by-election on Saturday, Saturday, whereby the Coalitionists retained both Stockport seats but lost the Dartford-Kent constituency. In the Dartford contest the successful Labor-Socialist candidate was a young shop steward from the Woolwich Arsenal and a comparatively uneducated man. On the other hand the noted economist, Sir Leo Money, was defeated in Stockport on the Labor ticket with the local co-operative Labor candidate.

The Manchester Guardian mildly reflects that the only party which has no ground for rejoicing over either Stockport or Dartford are the Liberals.

Sir Hamar Greenwood, the new Irish secretary, who originally looked like having a walkover in Sunderland, is now faced with Liberal and Labor opposition.

FACTIONAL QUARRELS DESTROYING MORALE IN D'ANNUNZIO'S ARMY

Poet-Soldier in Fiume Asks For Lighter Blockade.

Trieste, April 12.—Conditions in Fiume are becoming more critical daily owing to factional quarrels among the d'Annunzio troops, labor unrest, and the lack of food and work. Capt. d'Annunzio has sent to Rome a committee headed by Signor De Ambrasi, chief secretary to Mayor Gigante, to discuss with Premier Nitti plans for a relaxation of the blockade of the city.

BRITISH AND FRENCH REALIZE NECESSITY OF REMAINING ON FRIENDLY TERMS, STATES LAW

Government Leader in British Parliament Intimates That the Differences That Have Arisen Between Two Nations Will Soon Disappear.

London, April 12.—Both France and Great Britain are increasingly convinced of the necessity of keeping in agreement for the settlement of the questions regarding Germany and those affecting other parts of the world, Andrew Bonar Law, the Government leader, told the House of Commons today.

Answering questions with regard to the Anglo-French situation, Mr. Bonar Law said:

"As the House is aware, a difference, which His Majesty's Government greatly deplures, has arisen between the British and French governments, but the exchange of notes which has taken place between London and Paris justifies the belief that both governments recognize more than ever the necessity of maintaining an intimate, cordial agreement in the settlement of the great questions now confronting them in Germany and elsewhere."

"FRANK HALL," THE SOLDIER WHO HAS LOST HIS MEMORY

Efforts are being made to identify this man, soldier of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, who reached Toronto a few days ago, after having spent about three years in England in different hospitals, where the doctors have been trying to restore his memory which he lost through being gassed in France.

He thinks that his name is Frank Hall and that he worked for the Massey-Harris Company in Brantford, but on inquiry and search of the records there, no such man was known. He is also under the impression that a sister of his is married in California. He is now in the Dominion Orthopedic Hospital, on Christie street, Toronto.

HONOLULU PLANNING BIG RECEPTION FOR PRINCE OF WALES

Hawaiians To Extend Hearty Welcome To British Heir.

Honolulu, April 12.—Elaborate preparations are being made here to welcome the Prince of Wales when he reaches Honolulu aboard H.M.S. Renown.

The date of the arrival of his royal highness, falls in Centennial Week when the first Christian missionaries, who landed on the island of Oahu, celebrated the hundredth anniversary of the coming of the first Christian missionaries.

When the Renown enters Honolulu harbor a United States fleet of 36 vessels, headed by the Brooklyn, flagship of Rear Admiral Henry Wiley, will exchange naval courtesies with the British fleet.

Governor Charles J. McCarthy is planning a reception and ball in the prince's honor, while the chamber of commerce, British Club and other Honolulu organizations, are preparing programs for the entertainment of the heir to the British throne.

The city of Hilo, on the island of Hawaii, has also extended an invitation to the Prince of Wales to visit there and view the volcano of Kilauea.

FRENCH LIFT TAX AGAINST FRANKFORT

Paris, April 12.—Decision to lift the tax of 10,000 marks levied against the city of Frankfurt for aggression against French cyclist chassours is announced by Gen. De Motz, commander of French forces in the city, according to a Magenta dispatch. This is a result of steps taken by the burghers of the city, and on account of the good behavior of the people during the last few days, it is said.

Reports that France has planned to occupy Mannheim and Heidelberg, south of Mayence, printed in the Cologne Gazette, are denied here.

HOUSE TO DISCUSS SITUATION BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE

London, April 12.—Discussion of relations between Great Britain and France in the House of Commons is not probable for some days, although anxiety is felt by many members of Parliament, who assembled today after the Easter recess. There is a desire in some political quarters to bring the situation before the full house, but debate cannot be brought about unless those desiring it can carry a motion to suspend the order of business on a plea of urgency.

Andrew Bonar Law, Government leader in the House, has been deputized by Premier Lloyd George, who has some to San Remo, Italy, to make official statements during the latter's absence, but members are declared to have expressed little confidence they will hear more than they already know.

HOLLAND MAKING BIG LOAN TO GERMANY

Money Will Be Used To Purchase Foodstuffs.

The Hague, April 12.—Holland has arranged for a credit to Germany of 50,000,000 florins. Half of the credit will be available immediately, and Germany will utilize it for purchasing in Holland grain, meat, cheese and cattle fodder.
