#### **VETERANS WILL ASK** MANY AMENDMENTS TO PENSIONS ACT

Several Changes in Measure Recommended by Commissioners.

Ottawa, April 12.—(Canadian Press.)
—When the special committee on pensions and re-establishment meets tomorrow morning, it is expected to have before it several proposed amendments to the pensions act, which have been drafted by the members of the board of pension commissioners. Members of the board have stated that they will give no inkling of the changes until their proposals have been placed before the committee. The G. W. V. A., through its secretary, C. G. MacNeil, will it is stated, introduce before the committee the resolution on penthe committee the resolution on pensions, which was passed at the annual meeting of the association in Montreal, and as the committee sittings progress will introduce evidence showing the need of better pensions' regulations for the former Canadian soldiers and their dependents, by the Government. A., also asks that in the case of dependents, who are now receiving by way of charity, allowances in respect to soldiers who died subsequent to discharge, these allowances be continued for ten years.

#### SINN FEINERS ON HUNGER STRIKE; IN SERIOUS STATE

They demand the observance of the agreement obtained by Bishop MacRory and the Lord Mayor of Dublin, whereby the English Government undertook to recognize the special status of political prisoners.
